On Saturday, the Kiddie Parade begins at 11 a.m. one block east of St.

Wenceslaus Church. The route goes one block south and a half-block west and ends up in Sokol Park where all activities take place. Any child who is not yet 12 years of age may participate in the parade. Bring your entry to the start of the parade route by 10 a.m. for assignment of category and number. The categories are: Dolls, Bicycle, Pet, and Miscellaneous.
