BOARD OF TRADE

CHICAGO (AP) — Grains futures mostly fell Tuesday on the Chicago Board of Trade. Wheat for July delivery fell 14.50 cents to \$6.16 a bushel; July corn fell 8 cents to \$5.84 a bushel; July oats fell 0.50 cent to \$2.9575 a bushel; while July soybeans rose 10.25 cents to \$14.35 a bushel. Beef and pork futures traded mixed on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange. August live cattle were unchanged at \$1.2030 a pound; August feeder cattle rose 0.90 cent to \$1.6115 a pound; while July lean hogs fell 0.87 cent to 92.80 cents a pound.

Both Wednesday and Thursday programs are free, but a park sticker is required for park entry, Loecker said. "Even though they have to get a park sticker, it's worth it, because they're really going to get a lot of information in an hour," she said. Along with information, many programs will also feature take-home materials, Loecker said. "With a lot of them, they are going to be able to take something back with them, whether it is something they make, a little bracelet to remember they've been out there, or a pamphlet to remember more about an animal we're talking about," she said. A wide variety of topics will be featured, Loecker said, so visitors are encouraged to attend as many programs as they wish. "It's something that people can keep coming back to over and over and learn something new each time," she said. Missouri National Recreational River, Southeast South Dakota's and Northeast Nebraska's hometown national park, will present the following programs this weekend: Friday, June 15 — 8 p.m.: Burbach Picnic Shelter, Lewis & Clark Lake State Recreation Area, Neb. — "Where's the Park?" It's South Dakotans versus Nebraskans as visitors test and expand their knowledge of America's special places through a hands-on game and an engaging presentation. Saturday, June 16 — 11 a.m.-1 p.m., Lewis & Clark Visitor Center at Gavins Point Dam — "Disappearing: Trick or Tragedy?" Why are certain native Missouri River species in danger of extinction? What is being done to prevent their demise and what can we all do to help their recovery? A National Park Ranger answers these questions and shows why these species are important to the river ecosystem. — 14 p.m., Pierson Ranch picnic shelter — National Park Rangers join South Dakota state park naturalists and local reenactors for "Homestead Days." Experience a taste of life in the days of free land. Rangers will exhibit replicas and actual items from the 1800s and help kids make their own pioneer-era game. — 2 p.m., Niobrara State Park, Nebraska — "Walk With a Ranger" A National Park Ranger leads visitors on a hike along the bluffs and bottoms overlooking the Missouri River in this scenic state park and reveals the wild nature of the river and the stories of those who followed it. — 7 p.m., Midway Amphitheater, Lewis & Clark State Recreation Area — "Pelts & Profits" The Missouri River was the highway of the fur trade, connecting the Plains Tribes to the manufactured goods of the world. A trader of the 1850s shows samples of the goods available and gives kids the opportunity to make a deal in Plains Sign language. — 7 p.m., Niobrara State Park, Nebraska, cookout shelter — "Let Me Go Home!"
