With the introduction of wood bats to all levels of South Dakota amateur baseball this summer, naturally it

was going to take some time for Class B teams to adjust. A month into the South Central League season, I think it's safe to say teams have adjusted. Through my frequent contacts with league managers and players (not only for our weekly notebook stories, but for stats, game reports and other conversations), it is becoming apparant that the 9 Class B teams in the league are now comfortable using wood bats.

The change from aluminum bats wasn't going to have a huge impact for a team like the Irene Cardinals,

but for other teams like Scotland or Lesterville or Menno, there was going to be a significant impact. In other words, teams that traditionally field powerful hitters will still rack up the home runs, no matter the stick being

Following suit, the Irene duo of Mike King and Simon Healy lead the SCL with three homers apiece. A group of five players have two homers, including Avon's Dan Bures, Crofton's Bill Guenther, Irene's Wes Robertson, Tabor's Doug Vanecek and Wynot's Lee Heimes. Then there's a group of 17 players with one homer this sea-including three more from Irene.

As the summer progresses, I would expect those numbers to pick up, as teams become more and more familiar with wood bats, and what it takes to plant the ball over the fence (certainly harder than with aluminum).

In the meantime, however, Irene figures to continue its powerful ways.

### **USD's Buell, Duling Named Sum**mit League Track Athletes Of The Year

VERMILLION — University of South Dakota track and field athletes Bethany Buell and Alexa Duling have been named the 2012 Summit League Women's Outdoor Track and Field Athletes of the Year, the league announced on Wednesday. The honors, which are voted on by the league's coaches, are the highest individual honor a track athlete can attain from the league.

The two Coyotes are the first to earn Athlete of the Year honors in a sport from the Summit League.

Duling (Gregory), a junior, was named the Outdoor Frack Athlete of the Year after earning second-team All-America honors with a 12th-place finish in the 400-meter hurdles (57.70) at her first NCAA Championships. At The Summit League Outdoor Championships, she swept the 100- and 400-meter hurdles with times of 13.90 and 1:00.24. Duling recorded a school record time of 57.40 at the NCAA West Preliminaries to advance to the national

Buell (St. Louis, Mo.), a sophomore, collected the Outdoor Field Athlete of the Year award after earning first team All-America honors and a Summit League best thirdplace finish in the pole vault at the NCAA Championships. The St. Louis, Mo., native cleared a school-record height

of 14-5 1/4 (4.40m) and became the first Coyote to place in the top three at the Division I national meet. Buell captured a league-best two Athlete of the Week selections and won the league pole vault title with a league-record height of 14-0 1/2 (4.28m).

Both Coyotes were named to the Academic All-Summit League team earlier this month, and both earned Distinquished Scholar Status.

### **Former Jackrabbit Thielbar One** Step Away From Majors

**Impact Of Wood Bats In Amateur Baseball Seems To Be Slowing** 

ROCHESTER, N.Y. — Former South Dakota State University pitcher Caleb Thielbar was recently promoted by the Minnesota Twins to their Triple-A affiliate Rochester Red Wings, putting the left-hander one step away from the

Thielbar began the 2012 season in A-ball with Fort Myers of the Florida State League, where was turned in a 1-1 record despite not allowing an earned run in seven appearances, covering 12.1 innings. He then made 16 relief appearances at Double-A New Britain (Conn.), compiling a 2-0 record with a 1.80 ERA in 25 innings. In a combined 37.1 innings this season, Thielbar has struck out 42 batters and walked only five. A native of Randolph, Minn., Thielbar was drafted by

the Milwaukee Brewers in the 18th round of the 2009 Major League Baseball Draft. He spent two seasons in the Brewers organization before signing with the Twins late in the 2011 campaign after a brief stint with the St. Paul Saints of the independent American Association.

In four season's (2006-09) at SDSU, Thielbar posted a 20-19 career record while setting the Jackrabbit career record with 274 innings pitched in 64 appearances - 44 starts. He also ranks second in career strikeouts with 196 and shares the team single-season record with 100 strikeouts, set during his senior campaign.

### **Determan Signs With DWU Golf**

MITCHELL — The Dakota Wesleyan University men's golf team added a third signee for the 2012-13 season this week when head coach Adam Anderson announced the signing of Jay Determan.

Determan, a Burke native, is the third South Dakota native to sign with the Tigers for the upcoming season. He oins Hot Springs' Brady Besco and Winner's Anthony Husher, as well as eight other South Dakota natives already on the Dakota Wesleyan roster.

Determan joins the Tigers after earning four varsity letters on the South Central boys' golf team. He had a stroke average of 80 and finished in 21st at the Class B state golf tournament as a senior in 2011. That same year, he took third at regions and helped the Cougars to the region title and a fifth-place finish at the state meet.

room for his willingness to play through injuries and still produce late in last year's miserable 3-13 season. In May, Harvin showed

up at voluntary workouts despite still recovering from shoulder surgery and spoke of asserting himself as a leader and encouraging other players to participate

in the team's offseason program. He caught 87 passes for 967 vards and six touchdowns last season, rushed for another 345 yards and two scores and also returned a kick for a touchdown

during a sensational year. Harvin dealt with migraine headaches and numerous other minor injuries as the result of his punishing style of play, missing one game his rookie season and two in 2010, which brought concerns about his durability over

the long term. He played in all 16 games last season, establishing himself as one of the game's top slot receivers and most dangerous kick

"Percy is a phenomenal player on the field," Spielman said. "And you look at his statistics he had last year and how important he is to this franchise. He's a vital part of us moving forward with this

But somewhere between his appearance at team headquarters in May and his return to Minnesota this week, something went wrong for Harvin. After making the NFC title

game as a rookie, the Vikings have taken significant steps backward the last two seasons. They are centering their rebuild on Harvin, Peterson, who is recovering from a torn ACL in his left knee, and second-year quarterback Christian Ponder.

Harvin is far and away Ponder's best option in the receiver corps that includes non-descript veterans Jenkins and Devin Aromashodu, rookie fourth-round picks Jarius Wright and Greg Childs and Simpson, who will be suspended for the first three games this season after being arrested on drug charges while with the Cincinnati Bengals.

After signing tight end John Carlson from Seattle, there has been a lot of talk about the Vikings going to more two tightend sets to take advantage of him and second-year tight end Kyle Rudolph. That could also be a concern for Harvin, but offensive coordinator Bill Musgrave said he was unaware of any problems Harvin had with the playbook. Musgrave said he planned to get the ball to Harvin even more this

season. 'We're looking forward to getting him on the field and as an offense we're looking forward to

having a better year," Musgrave said. "That's the bottom line." Peterson said he hadn't spo-


