(about the issue), and I think there's a lot of misconceptions about tiling. We have people who say, 'Tiling floods my land.' This was an item last year when we were drowning out (with wet conditions).

The Bon Homme County Commission has shown reluctance in becoming entangled with drainage disputes, particularly with regards to tiling, Pesek said.

'We leave it up to the soil conservation people because they know the lay of the land. They are the technical board," he said. "Right now, we are getting away from (acting on the issue) unless people are draining into

"My cousin was killed (five days ago). They bombed his house and he died," she said. "And my second cousin, they shot him and he died. And one cousin, they shot him, but he is alive now. They saved him."

Through Facebook and phone calls, Binder has been communicating with her family about the uprising, a conflict that has resulted in more than 15,000 casualties, mostly civilians, since it began last spring, according to Syria Human Rights Monitor. Her family has sent her several videos and pictures of the violence,

Carbon monoxide poisoning symptoms may be easily overlooked because of their similarity to other health-related problems, according to the Idaho Parks and Recreation, and symptoms can include watery and itchy eyes, flushed appearance, throbbing temples, inattentiveness or lack of concentration, inability to think coherently, ringing in the ears, tightness across the chest,

headache, drowsiness, nausea, dizziness, fatigue, vomiting, collapse and convulsions.

Nickles said he understands people want to grill during the summer and that sometimes it does rain, but people should take the proper precautions during those situation.

Some people will pull the grill in the garage if it's raining," Nick-les said. "People should be aware that you need to keep that garage ventilated and keep the air moving.'

Campers can also come in contact with the gas.

"If there's a chilly morning, they might turn the heat on for a little bit," Nickles said. "If they haven't really checked it out for the year, that can be a danger. We recommend installing the monoxide detectors; and some of the new camper manufacturers are installing monoxide detectors in the campers now."

Nickles said the most important thing people can do for prevention of carbon monoxide poisoning is to educate

It is important to look up information online to see what kinds of dangers of carbon monoxide are associated with summer, he said.

the gas doesn't migrate into the house.

"That's where a lot of our calls come from," Nickles said. "Carbon monoxide mixes fairly evenly with air, and although we're more apt to have a door or a window open this time a year, those hazards still exist."

Nickles said some people also associate having the car running in the garage with wintertime months, when they let the car warm up inside the garage.

"People have a tendency to work on their cars in the garage during the summer, though, because of the shade. If they don't have good ventilation going, that

carbon monoxide can still make it into the house or the shop while they're working," he said.

Carbon monoxide detectors can be purchased at any of the hardware stores in Yankton, Nickles said, and he suggests installing them in houseboats, cabin-boats and campers. He said it is also important to make sure the detectors that people do have are in working condition.

'The second thing is, use some common sense and think about where those fumes are going when you're working on things that produce carbon monoxide," Nickles said.
