PIERRE — The Postsecondary Education Interim Committee will hold its first meeting on June 27 in Pierre. The meeting will be held in Room 414 of the State Capitol, beginning at 1 p.m.

The committee will hear from representatives of the Board of Regents, the state's public postsecondary technical institutes, and the South Dakota Department of Education who will address topics including the purpose of postsecondary education, the importance of the state's investment in postsecondary education, and the history of how the state has funded postsecondary education through the years.

This meeting is open to the public.
