National Park Service Bridge Walks Slated

Rangers at Missouri National Recreational River will conduct walks to the historic Meridian Bridge and present short talks on a variety of subjects. The walks will begin at the Territorial Capitol replica in Yank-ton's Riverside Park at 11:30 a.m., 12:30 p.m. and 3 p.m.

Upon reaching the bridge, the talks will last no more than 15 minutes, after which visitors may continue across the bridge, return to downtown Yankton, or chat with the ranger on the way back to the capitol. In case of rain, talks will be at the capitol building.

Rangers will be at the capitol replica from 10 a.m.-4 p.m. most weekdays to answer questions about the river and provide information to visitors and the community. Next week's programs are as follows:

• Monday, June 25: "Not Just a River" — The National Park Service protects not just the Missouri River, but many other natural and cultural resources associated with the river. Discover the "outstandingly remarkable values" that led Congress to create the Missouri National Recreational River.




