One day, your big brother boards a train for a Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC) work camp. Soon, a \$25 check is arriving each month in the mail. Your parents are able to buy food and necessities. Once, there was enough money left over to buy your sister a new Easter dress and

The CCC was a 1930's federal jobs program that gave work to more than 26,000 young men in South Dakota. They planted trees in forests, built state parks, constructed roads, improved farmland and did hundreds of projects across the state, including work in the Black Hills Na-

Join Bill Jamerson as he presents a musical tribute to the CCC Boys on Wednesday, June 5, at the Riverside Park Amphitheatre, at 6:30 p.m. Jamerson will tell the history in story and song as this nation cele-
