# **Camp Luther Director Hopes To Change Lives**

SCHUYLER, Neb — Bruce Wall was a teenager "living in darkness" when he attended a lock-in with the Lutheran congregation in his Idaho hometown.

The event, led by the staff of a local camp, changed his life.

Wall, a high school student at the time, left the lock-in with a newfound relationship with his Savior, which kick-started a life devoted to serv-

As the new executive director of Camp Luther of Nebraska, Wall hopes to ignite this same passion in youths here.

The *Columbus Telegram* reports he was hired May 1 to lead the Christian camp located between Columbus and Schuyler, about 5 1/2 miles north of U.S. Highway 30.

A graduate of Concordia University in Seward, where he met his wife Sarah, Wall will take the reins of the camp and its ministry this summer, when the Rausch family departs after a decade of

Although this is his first stint as a camp director, Wall knows Camp Luther is where God wants his family to be.

After he and his wife spent time as missionaries in Peru, Wall said he looked at opportunities within the Lutheran Church across the country.

'We prayed about it," he said. "One day it just became clear that this is where we want to

It didn't hurt that his wife, whose father is a Lutheran pastor in Goehner, spent four summers from 2000 to 2003 as a staff member at Camp

Sarah, a licensed teacher and present stay-athome mother, and the couple's three young children will move to the camp from their Seward County residence in August.

Wall already is living on-site, preparing for a busy summer and mapping out his visions for a camp he sees so much potential in.

He said a top priority will be reaching out to and better serving the local Hispanic community, something he believes the Lutheran Church hasn't done a good job of in the past.

Camp Luther, he said, should be a venue His-

panics feel comfortable using.
Wall, who has a bachelor's degree in secondary education, also wants to provide more educational opportunities at the 46-year-old camp.

He said the programming already in place at Camp Luther can be used as a model for churches and nonprofit organizations as they adapt to changing demographics. His vision includes more interaction with rural congregations through activities such as Bible camps, as well as increasing the number of partnerships with non-

The Columbus Family YMCA currently holds day camps there each summer, but Wall believes other organizations could utilize the 160-acre

Lutherans, hosts retreats and camps year-round for youth and church groups, schools, businesses and other organizations.

Specialized camps focus on topics such as photography, space, cooking and sports and His Kids Camps held each June give people with mental and physical disabilities a chance to experience the outdoors while interacting one-onone with a volunteer.

Wall is particularly excited about the His Kids

It's these campers and the hundreds of others who visit Camp Luther each year who will make it hard for Hank Rausch and his family to say

"There will certainly be some tugs of the heart when it's time to leave," said Rausch. But, he added, it's the right time for the family to make its exit.

Rausch, the former executive director, has had health issues the past couple of years and his son Josh, the program director, got married in November. His wife Christina, a youth specialist through AmeriCorps, will attend Concordia University, which required Josh to take a new

The family, including Rausch's wife Sue, who is the outdoor education and food service coordinator, will leave Camp Luther at the end of

July.

"It will be tough, there's no doubt about it," said Rausch, "but it's what needs to be done."

#### **Walk, Picnic To Honor Man Who Drowned**

SIOUX FALLS (AP) — A memorial walk and picnic are being held this coming week at Falls Park in Sioux Falls to honor a man who drowned while trying to save a young boy.

The Native American Council of Tribes is hosting the walk and picnic on Friday for 28-year-old Lyle Eagle Tail.

Eagle Tail drowned in March after jumping into the Big Sioux River at Falls Park after 6-year-old Garrett Martin Wallace fell into the frothing water or became obscured by the gathering foam. The boy later emerged from the water and was not injured. The walk and picnic will start at 10 a.m.

# **Landscape Grants Available For Neb. Schools**

LINCOLN, Neb. (AP) — Grant funds are available for Nebraska schools that would educate students about the environment while sprucing up the school landscapes.

BEATRICE, Neb. — Beatrice may notice some fresh young faces in town over the next five weeks.

Eight AmeriCorps workers arrived in Beatrice Wednesday night and will be in town until June 26 to do service projects for the community, focusing their work mainly at the Homestead National Monument of America.

AmeriCorps is a federally funded volunteer program. The team in Beatrice began their 10month program in February. They will focus their work in the Midwest.

In the past few months the group has worked at the Headwaters Science Center in Bemidji, Minn., and Custer State Park in South Dakota.

Rob Ruskamp, facility manager at the Homestead National Monument, told the *Beatrice* Daily Sun this will give the park an opportunity to share with the AmeriCorps team what the National Parks Service has to offer and help the park get projects

The group will be working on maintenance projects like fixing fencing, painting and weed and tree removal.

Park Ranger Tina Miller said she will use the team's talents to help her to create lesson plans and video. The group's solo project will be leading the children's festival at the monument during Homestead Days.

They will also be doing other service projects around town. The team comes from all across the country including Ore-

gon and New York. For 10 months, they work, eat and live together. The biggest aspect of the program is learning how to handle multiple relationships in close proximity," AmeriCorps team member Nick Meyers said.

Meyers said the exciting aspect of the program is not knowing where he is going to be in the next six weeks.
