"Plus, we're giving some of that additional revenue to another water utility. What we're trying to wrestle with is, are we just paying their debt service and increasing our own debt service?

John Lichter asked why the proposed collector well isn't being built closer to the treatment plant in order to save money.

"When vou look at locations closer to the plant, you hit gray shale and 40 or 50 feet, so you can't get the quantity of water you are looking for," Goodmanson responded. "When you go down to Paddle Wheel Point, you go down more than 100 feet before you hit shale.

The commission was asked by Mike Dellinger, president of Yankton Area Progressive Growth, about how the proposed increases in water costs would affect Yankton's standing among other South Dakota communities.

"As we know, it's important for us from a growth perspective for the future for industry and population," he said.

Viereck said Yankton's water rates are currently in the middle of the state's 10 first-class cities.

"There are currently three different cities that are looking at large projects, also," he added. "If we adopt any of these (proposed options to pay for the water system upgrade), we're going to be pushed toward the higher end of Class One cities, but we probably still won't be as high as two of the three cities that are experiencing the same thing we are once they adopt and go forward.

If the city can't ensure a steady water supply to potential businesses, Nelson said Yankton will fall behind in the future.

"We've got to be able to tell these people who come in that, 'Yes, we can provide the water you need now and in the future,"

Dellinger said his membership has not expressed much of an opinion on the possibility of increased water costs yet, but he expects the issue will come up at the

organization's June 10 meeting.

After the meeting, Wenande said she was disappointed more people didn't show up for the meeting, but was pleased with how it went.

"I thought the questions were great this evening," she said.
"They covered a lot of areas that Kyle and Al hadn't covered in their presentations.

Goodmanson detailed the plans for building a new collector well at Paddle Wheel Point and constructing a new water plant during his presentation, while Viereck focused on the options for funding the projects.

The commission is currently favoring a mixture of a surcharge and usage rate increases to fund the improvements, rather than a property tax opt-out or just a surcharge.

"None of these proposals are easy," Viereck said. "All of them are expensive. But if we're going to move forward with this project, we have to raise \$1.5 million

In closing, Viereck presented a gallon of bottled water he bought at a local store for \$1.29. He pointed out that there was also a special where customers could get four gallons from a bulk tank for \$1. In other words, the cost of water in the latter scenario would be 25 cents a gallon.

"Currently, the average (City of Yankton water) customer that uses 5,000 gallons per month pays slightly less than half a penny a gallon for our water," Viereck said.

If the city approved a funding option that mixes a surcharge and increased water usage rates, the average residential user would pay \$37.02 monthly.
"Nobody can minimize the ef-

fect of that increase, but put it in perspective for what you are paying when you go to the store and buy a gallon of water," Viereck stated. "We take it for granted so much when we turn that little silver handle and clean water comes out. We think we run a fairly efficient water system, and when you put it in perspective of what it costs to buy it retail, we do a really good job.'

and the other at Lake Area Technical Institute in Watertown. General Aviation accounts for \$303 million in total impact in the state, or \$401 per capita.

The state of South Dakota has a significant interest in the continued vitality of general aviation, aerospace, aircraft manufacturing, educational institutions and aviation organizations and community airports and airport operators. General aviation contributes to the state's economy and medical care, transports goods to the state's Indian

reservations, supports forest fire fighting, and boosts economic development for small communities. General Aviation is integral to the state's response to emergencies and natural disasters, as well as a key component of business at South Dakota's commercial airports.

Organizations like the South Dakota Pilots Association, South Dakota Airport Managers Association, South Dakota Aviation Association, four chapters of the Experimental Aircraft Association, SD Wing of Civil Air Patrol, the Alliance for Aviation Across America, National Business Aviation Association, National Association of State Aviation Officials, and National Air Transportation Association recognize and promote the interests and importance of aviation in South Dakota and throughout the world.

Governor Daugaard's executive proclamation recognizes that communities within South Dakota depend heavily on general aviation and community airports for the continued flow of commerce, tourism, and visitors to our state.
