

Burbank Man Will Be Arraigned On Rape Charges

An arraignment has been set for 9 a.m. Tuesday for a Burbank man charged with rape,

among other offenses. Joseph T. Night, 63, has been charged with 13 counts of varying severity, including four counts of rape in the first degree, two counts of sexual exploitation of a minor, two counts of sexual contact with a child under the age of 16, two counts of aggravated incest and one count of simple assault-domestic.

Night also has been charged with interference with emergency communication and in-

tentional damage to property. Clay County States Attorney Teddi Gertsma said the charges followed a call that was placed

other options that meet the goals of expansion. Nordquist said a failure to expand Medicaid could expose some employers in Nebraska to federal penalties for having workers that aren't insured.

"I challenge our colleagues who continue to say no to Medicaid expansion to put their solution on the able," Nordquist said.

The expansion measure would offer Medicaid to more low-income adults under the Affordable Care Act. It was originally required under the health care law, but the U.S.

Supreme Court ruled that the federal government cannot penalize states that refuse to expand the program.

Like other states, Nebraska splits costs for the federal-state Medicaid program for the poor and disabled with the U.S. government. The federal government pays at least 50 percent. The federal contribution has slowly trended downward since the 1990s, according to the Nebraska Department of Health and Human Services, although it has never dropped below the 50 percent minimum.

The federal government has agreed to pay 100 percent of the cost for new Medicaid recipients from 2014 to 2016. Aid would gradually decrease until 2020, when the federal government would pay 90 percent of the costs for patients who fall under Medicaid expansion.
