"It was so fun to be able to talk to other girls and learn about where they are from and what things are like at their schools," she said. "I was nervous going in and I was scared I wasn't going to meet friends, but I really did meet a lot of good people and it was really fun for me."

The Yankton representatives were each awarded scholarships that are good for \$1,000 at the University of South Dakota, South Dakota State University and the School of Mines, and are worth \$500 at every other South Dakota school.

Schulte said she knows each of them will put the scholarships to good use.

"Only the top girls get to walk away with an award and a scholarship, so it was really nice to get the recognition and to be recognized for being leaders," she said. "To get the opportunity to represent Yankton and to get the scholarship was great."

Livingston said she has always been interested in pre-med, but her experiences at Girls State have potentially influenced what she wants to get a degree in.

"Everything just happened," she said. "It would have been cool to be governor or some big title like that, but the Supreme Court was so interesting and it

was so cool to wear the robes and be in an actual court room.

"I was always stuck on pre-med, but now I'm not sure what I want to do because being a lawyer sounds really cool too."

Schulte has also been planning on going into pre-med, and her experiences at Girls State helped reinforce that for her.

"I've always planned on going into the medical field, and this pushed me to believe that I can do whatever I want in the medical field and that I have what it takes," she said.

Livingston even walked away from the week with improved social skills, she said.

"I went to Starbucks after I left Girls State and I saw some people in line and I was so willing to talk to them and was so open," she said. "It was just normal. Usually I would just stand there and wait, but Girls State makes you so open to everything, and things are just totally different now."

Rodrig also took away something more than a scholarship, and that was an awareness of government, she said.

"Girls State really teaches you how to be active in your government," she said. "Even if I'm not going to major in government or politics or do anything with government for my career there are still ways to be active as an adult."

When asked whether or not to prohibit name brand drug companies from entering into agreements with generic drug companies to lower costs, about half of the audience members said they would support prohibiting the action.

Audience members were concerned they would not receive full quality prescriptions if drug companies were allowed to enter into agreements with generic drug companies.

"The fund isn't broke and the

system isn't broken," he said. "It may just need some tweaking."

"Our goal is really to get people talking about Social Security and Medicare, and I think we accomplished that," Stevens said. "It's the same goal as last year, but last year the thrust was more about asking people about their ideas and their suggestions. This year was more about reacting to things and getting ideas in terms of how we should react."

Stevens said the issues discussed are the ones AARP has heard the most concern about.
