makes a move. During this waiting period, it gets very awkward."

Domitrz said this happens with everyone, not just teenagers.

"We're not afraid of being awkward. We're really good at it," he said. "Regardless of age, if you've dated, you've been awkward."

Domitrz said that people are actually afraid because they've never been taught to use words in intimate situations.

"No human being is going to do something during what is considered a sensitive moment in life if we've never learned how to do it," he said.

Just as important as asking permission is being prepared to handle "no" as a response, Domitrz said.

The most common answer to a "no" is, "Why not?" he said. This is because people are looking for a reason to change a "no" into a "yes," he said.

"Steve did a good job. The vote went well," Nickles said.

"It's tough to see experience like Steve's go," he added. "I've been at a lot of incidents and meetings with Steve."

Some of the most memorable fires Hermanson responded to were blazes at the WNAX radio station, the Robinson-Ehret car dealership and Yaggie's Grain and Feed.

"One of the worst situations I went into was the fire at the old Honda shop (west of Yankton along Highway 52) when part of the roof collapsed on me," Hermanson recalled. "I was brought out of the building and taken to the hospital."

Fortunately, only minor injuries

Domitrz said that instead of trying to change an answer, the best thing to do is respect it.

"Whatever their reasoning is, you should simply say, 'I'm glad I asked. The last thing I want is to make you feel uncomfortable,'" he said.

While the presentation was directed mostly at teens and their parents, Domitrz said his advice is suitable for anyone, regardless of age. It should also be used by both genders, he said.

"(People) assume that it's the man's job (to ask), which is one of the most awful things that a parent can teach their child," Domitrz said. "Think about what you're saying to your daughter if you say it's the man's job. You're saying it's your partner's job to decide what happens to your body."

Domitrz said that along with being productive, asking permission before an action also has another benefit — partners like it.

"People love being asked, because you feel pursued," he said. "It's romantic because you're getting to verbally hear that the person is attracted to you instead of just guessing."

Hermanson's wife, Nancy, said firefighting has been a part of her life for 32 of the 35 years they have been married.

"I'm really proud of him and our larger firefighter family," she stated. "It's been a privilege to be married to a firefighter. We have three boys that are also very proud of their dad."

It wasn't always easy being married to a firefighter, according to Nancy. It took some sacrifices.

Their boys still talk about the incident wherein Steve left them and their mother at Bonanza for a fire call, promising he would return. Ultimately, they had to walk home.

Domitrz added that asking also gives a person something that is rarely given during a moment of intimacy — a clear-cut choice.

"Now you might say, 'Wait a second, I have a choice. If my partner just goes for it, I can always say no.' That's not a choice, that's called self defense," he said. "Think about how scary that is to have a mindset that one person will sexually pursue and touch the other person until that person can physically or verbally stop them. And we call that dating ..."

"The fact is, every human being deserves a choice before you do something with their body ... And what's the ultimate way to give somebody a choice? You simply ask a question."

Ultimately, if a person can't ask that question, it means that something is missing, Domitrz said.

"What did you just learn about yourself? You're not ready," he said. "If you cannot talk to your partner about what you want to do with them intimately, you're not ready."

Minnesota Woman Survives Bear Attack

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) — A northern Minnesota woman was injured in a rare black bear attack after her dog startled an adult female and three yearlings that recently had been hanging around her home and raiding her bird feeder, officials said Wednesday.

Darlene Baglio, 72, was clawed on her left arm and side and bitten on her right arm and leg in the attack at her home near McGregor around 7 p.m. Monday. She was hospitalized overnight but went home Tuesday morning, said Maj. Phil Meier, enforcement operations manager for the Department of Natural Resources.

A conservation officer killed the 190-pound mother bear as it charged him, the incident report said. Officials left the yearlings alone to fend for themselves, while the woman's dog ran off and remained missing Wednesday afternoon.

It was only the fifth documented bear attack on a person in Minnesota that resulted in injuries since 1987 and the state's first serious attack since 2005, DNR officials told reporters. The agency estimates the state's bear population at around 12,000 to 15,000.

"The reason it's so rare is not because people don't encounter bears frequently, it's just because bears are very cautious of people and bears do not want to get themselves in a situation where they might have to attack a person," DNR bear specialist Dave Garshelis said. "It's just not in their nature to do that. They're scared of us. They're more scared of us than we are of them."

DNR spokesman Chris Niskanen said the woman was traumatized by the attack. She did not immediately return a call seeking comment Wednesday.

The woman, who'd seen the bears in her yard during the past few days, looked around before letting her golden retriever out Monday evening, said Maj. Phil Meier, the DNR's enforcement operations manager. She didn't see the bears until the yearlings took off from under her deck and the dog gave chase. She walked down to the bottom of her deck and yelled for her dog to come back.

That's when the sow attacked her, Meier said, first clawing her left side and knocking her down, then coming back to bite her. She was able to go back inside and call 911.

An Aitkin County deputy soon arrived, and Baglio was taken to a nearby hospital. The conservation officer spotted the bears nearby and followed them into the woods,

Holder Seeks Better Balance After Press Subpoenas

WASHINGTON — Addressing the aggressive government leak probes that have angered the news media, Attorney General Eric Holder said Wednesday a better balance needs to be struck between press freedom and safeguarding national secrets.

The attorney general has been conducting a series of meetings with news organizations to review how the Justice Department treats the media when the government investigates national security leaks. The department secretly subpoenaed some phone records of The Associated Press without prior notification. It also obtained a search warrant to secretly gather emails of Fox News journalist James Rosen.

In an interview with NBC, Holder said the Justice Department will come up with ways in which notice can be given to the media. The attorney general held out the possibility of involving the judiciary in such cases.

"I'm a little concerned that things have gotten a little out of whack," Holder said. "I think that we can do a better job than we have. We can reform those regulations, reform those

guidelines, to better reflect that balance."

The attorney general also spoke out against a legal requirement that arose in the Fox News case.

In addressing the requirement for obtaining a search warrant for Rosen's emails, the government characterized the journalist as a probable co-conspirator of a State Department contractor who was suspected of leaking classified information to Rosen.

Holder said he doesn't like that requirement because it means that Holder is in the position as a government official of branding a journalist as a criminal.

"I'm just not comfortable with that and we're going to change that," he told NBC.

Holder signed off on the search warrant application for the emails of the Fox News journalist.

Holder said that he has no intention of stepping down now and that he still has things that he wants to do and has discussed them with President Barack Obama. He said that once he's finished with those tasks, he and the president will determine when it's time to transition to a new attorney general.

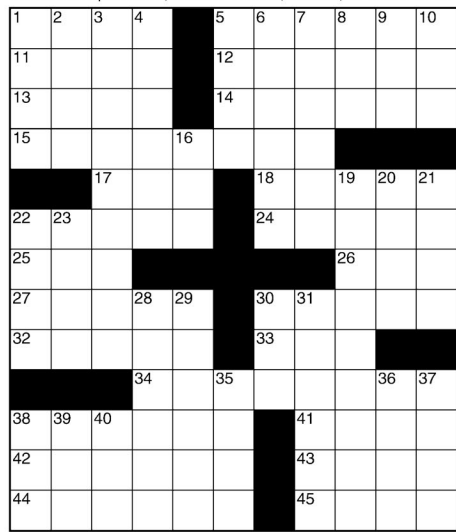
