# **Vermillion Man Arrested On Child Pornography Charges**

VERMILLION — A Vermillion man faces 10 counts of possessing child pornography, after his activities at the city's swimming pool prompted an investigation.

Roland Gilbaugh, 69, was arrested and charged with multiple counts of possession of child pornography, a Class III felony, according to Vermillion Police Chief Matt Betzen.

A Class III felony carries a maximum sentence of 15 years in the state penitentiary and a

\$30,000 fine. Gilbaugh remained in the Clay County Jail as of Friday afternoon, Betzen told the Vermillion Plain Talk.

Three computers, multiple hard drives and hundreds of CDs, DVDs and other digital storage devices were seized.

Gilbaugh was arrested and charged in the case. Bail was set at \$5,000.

"The Vermillion Police Department would like to acknowledge the caller who recognized there was a problem and was willing to confront the offender and call the police," Betzen said.
