

Vermillion Man Arrested On Child Pornography Charges

VERMILLION — A Vermillion man faces 10 counts of possessing child pornography, after his activities at the city's swimming pool prompted an investigation. Roland Gilbaugh, 69, was arrested and charged with multiple counts of possession of child pornography, a Class III felony, according to Vermillion Police Chief Matt Betzen. A Class III felony carries a maximum sentence of 15 years in the state penitentiary and a \$30,000 fine. Gilbaugh remained in the Clay County Jail as of Friday afternoon, Betzen told the Vermillion Plain Talk. In a news release, the police chief outlined the events leading to the arrest. On May 31, the Vermillion police department responded to a report of an older male "hanging around" Prentis Park, taking photos of small children in the playground and pool area. The caller, a summer supervisor for a summer children's program, was suspicious of the man and felt uncomfortable with the attention that the man was giving the children. The supervisor confronted

the man and then called the police. An officer responded and spoke to the man, identified as Gilbaugh. "The officer spoke with Gilbaugh and became convinced that Gilbaugh's photographic efforts were for nefarious purposes," Betzen said in the statement. The Division of Criminal Investigation (DCI) was called, and investigators developed information leading to a search warrant being obtained for Gilbaugh's residence. Three computers, multiple hard drives and hundreds of CDs, DVDs and other digital storage devices were seized. Initial review of these items revealed they contained child pornography. Forensic examination of the seized items continues. Gilbaugh was arrested and charged in the case. Bail was set at \$5,000. "The Vermillion Police Department would like to acknowledge the caller who recognized there was a problem and was willing to confront the offender and call the police," Betzen said. "This type of vigilance and cooperation is necessary to protect our children."

School on Capitol Street at 1 p.m. From 1-2 p.m., tours of the historic gardens and a brief tour of the house will be featured. At 2 p.m., a glimpse into the lives of the original families during their residence in the home will be presented, featuring Board members and guaranteed to capture your imagination. Beginning at 2:30 p.m., there will once again be limited tours of the first floor of the home, walking tours locating historic homes of the neighborhood with Anne Swift, Board President, and garden tours of the two city lot grounds surrounding the home with certified arborist Stan Hoffart. The Cramer-Kenyon Home Board of Directors is indebted to Margaret Lyons for information disclosed during the home tour as well as to the influence of Dorothy Jencks for information shared on the garden tour, which showcases varieties of plants which might have grown during the Victorian period. There is no admission price for this event; donations will be gratefully accepted. Seating is available, but those who come to visit and spend the afternoon are urged to bring lawn chairs or blankets for their own comfort.
