South Dakota's Glisar Finishes 6th At NCAA Meet

EUGENE, Ore. — South Dakota junior Megan Glisar became the third Coyote to earn first-team All-American honors at the NCAA Outdoor Track and Field Championships this season, placing sixth in the women's high iump on Saturday.

Glisar tied her season-best height and her USD outdoor record with a mark of 6 feet, 0 inches. The junior added three points to USD's team score and joins women's pole vaulters Bethany Buell and Emily Grove as LISD's First-Team All-America honorees this season.

Arizona's Brigetta Barrett won the event with a height of 6-4 3/4.

In the final team standings, the South Dakota women tied Michigan State for 18th with 15 points and finished 16 spots better than last year. The Coyotes were the fourthbest school outside a non-BCS conference, and beat major conference schools such as UCLA (20th), Oklahoma (T-21st), USC (T-21st), and Auburn (T-23rd).

Augustana's Milbrath Taken By **Cleveland In 35th Round**

SIOUX FALLS — Augustana sophomore Jordan Milbrath was selected by the Cleveland Indians with the 1,041st pick of the 35th round of the Major League Base-

ball First-Year Player Draft on Saturday.

Milbrath was the third player with South Dakota ties taken in the draft. Rapid City native Sam Wolff, who played at New Mexico, was taken 190th overall by the Texas Rangers. Layne Somsen, a Yankton native who played at South Dakota State, was drafted 675th overall by the Cincinnati Reds.

Milbrath, a right-handed pitcher from Springfield, Minn., is the second Viking to be drafted in as many years. Derek Hansen was taken in the 25th round by the Óakland Athletics last year. Milbrath is the sixth player from Augustana to be selected in the MLB Draft.

Milbrath posted a 7-2 record in 2013 for the Vikings, making a team-high 12 starts. The sophomore posted a 4.57 ERA in 67 innings of work while striking out a team-

high 60 batters. Milbrath tossed two complete games and held opponents to a .285 batting average.

MIAMI (AP) — Jason Kidd is interested in the Brooklyn Nets' coaching position and plans to talk to the team this week, a person familiar with the situation said Sunday.

Kidd led the Nets to consecutive NBA Finals in 2002-03 as a player and is interested in replacing P.J. Carlesimo, the person told The Associated Press on condition of anonymity because the team is not discussing its search. The recently retired point guard's interest was first re-

ported by Yahoo Sports. The 40-year-old Kidd ended his career last week after a season with the Knicks, his 19th in the NBA. He is second on the career list in assists and steals, and is the Nets'
