RAPID CITY — Parker's Phil Bjorneberg was awarded the "Coaches Winners Circle" Coach of the Year award by the South Dakota Cross Country and Track & Field Coaches Association, as the organization announced its post-season awards for the 2012-13 track and field season.

Bjorneberg led the Parker girls to a second place finish and the boys to a third place finish in Class B, earning the Pheasants the combined team title award at the S.D. State Track and Field Meet in May.

USD's Starr Named To Preseason LB Watch List

VERMILION — South Dakota linebacker Tyler Starr was named to the College Football Performance Awards (CFPA) FCS Linebacker Award Watch List on Monday.

Starr, a senior from Little Rock, Iowa, had 74 tackles, seven tackles for loss and four sacks last season. He recorded 14 sacks and 19 tackles for loss in 2011. He is third on USD's all-time career sacks list with 18.

Recipients of CFPA Awards are based upon scientific rankings to which individual players increase the overall effectiveness of their teams. All players are eligible at their position and are not preemptively eliminated from consideration.

USD will start its season at home against UC-Davis on Aug. 31.

Reinke Wins Nebraska State 3-D Archery Tournament

UND Set To Begin Construction On Sports Facility

GRAND FORKS, N.D. (AP) — University of North Dakota officials say construction of a new indoor practice facility for the school's athletic teams should begin this fall.

The building will be constructed on the site of the old Ralph Englestad Arena, which was the home of UND hockey for 29 years. Demolition of the building began last week.

The UND Athletics High Performance Center will be used by all of the school's athletic teams, and especially provide a boost to spring sports like baseball, softball and

track, which find it difficult to practice in bad weather. Spring football practice will also be held there.

The facility will feature state-of-the-art strength, conditioning and sports medicine facilities, as well as coaches offices and locker rooms.

Vikings' Greenway To Have Minor Knee Surgery

EDEN PRAIRIE, Minn. (AP) — Minnesota Vikings linebacker Chad Greenway has been scheduled for arthroscopic knee surgery to address joint pain.

Greenway was absent from practice on Tuesday and coach Leslie Frazier said the eighth-year veteran will have the procedure done Wednesday. Frazier didn't specify which leg. The coach said Greenway would be fully recovered in time for training camp, which starts in 6 1/2 weeks.

A recent MRI test revealed some minor damage, and the Vikings decided the operation would be best done now rather than risk an aggravation later in the season.

Greenway tore the anterior cruciate ligament in his left knee in his first exhibition game in 2006, an injury that wiped out his rookie year. He has not missed a game since.

D-League's Skyforce To Be Affiliated Only With Miami Heat

SIoux FALLS (AP) — The NBA Development League

team in South Dakota is aligning itself solely with the NBA's Miami Heat.

The Sioux Falls Skyforce last season were affiliated with the Heat, the Minnesota Timberwolves, the Orlando Magic and the Philadelphia 76ers. The single-affiliation partnership involving the Skyforce and the defending NBA champion Heat starts with the 2013-14 D-League season.

The Heat will have full control over the Skyforce basketball operations, and Sioux Falls will adopt Miami's red, yellow, and black color scheme and signature font. Local ownership will retain the primary responsibility for the team's off-the-court business operations.

Quebec Premier Backs Soccer Turban Ban

MONTREAL (AP) — Quebec's premier is backing the decision by her province's soccer federation to ban youngsters from wearing turbans during games.

The Canadian Soccer Association suspended the Quebec Soccer Federation on Monday after the provincial body showed no sign of overturning its decision to uphold a ban on Sikh religious headwear on the field.

Quebec Premier Pauline Marois said Tuesday it's "unacceptable" that the national organization would suspend her province's federation.

The Quebec body cites safety concerns for banning turbans and points to FIFA rules, which don't specifically allow turbans. Others counter that regulations by international soccer's governing body don't explicitly ban turbans, either.

McCarthy Likes Packers' Sense Of Urgency

GREEN BAY, Wis. (AP) — Following second-round playoff losses in consecutive seasons, Green Bay Packers coach Mike McCarthy has seen a different look to his team this offseason.

"Frankly, I feel this — and I've thought it since I came back in April; it started in the weight room — this team has a different edge to it, a higher sense of urgency than I can recall," McCarthy said Tuesday.

"I don't know how to sit down and measure it and put it on a scale each year. Maybe it's my higher sense of urgency."

Indeed, according to quarterback Aaron Rodgers, that attitude adjustment starts at the top, with McCarthy.

"I think Coach is doing it and he's leading by example. I think he set the tone when we came back in April, and he set the tone when we came back in May off our break," Rodgers said.
