Rangers from the Missouri National Recreational River (MNRR) open the Territorial Capitol weekdays from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. During that time, the capitol features exhibits, and rangers offer guided walks over the Meridian Bridge with stops for short presentations.

At selected times during the week, Rokosz appears at the Territorial Capitol to re-enact a historical character.

In addition, he will help kick off a new program this Saturday night that features a special monthly event at the Capitol. This weekend's special event, called "Junior River Ranger Day," runs from 5-8 p.m.

At 7 p.m. Rokosz will re-enact the purser for the steamboat Far West. He will talk about the river's challenges and his adventures traveling the Missouri with Captain Grant Marsh, including the wild ride from the Little Bighorn.

When it comes to his re-enactments, Rokosz doesn't limit himself to Missouri River characters and will re-enact anyone from pioneer times.

"The late 1800s are such a huge historical era, and Yankton has the rail-to-river connection," he said. "When we had the education festival (in Riverside Park last month), I met with the students as a steamboat purser. Today, I'm a fur trader from the 1850s."

His exhibit included a variety of furs spread out on the floor.

"Any fur was fair game," he said. "You had buffalo, fox, rabbit, muskrat, deer, coyote and other animals." Fur traders worked with buyers, with

the American Fur Company as the largest of them, he said. Furs were shipped all over the world. The fur trade brought with it the use of

sign language for communication between parties, along with the interaction of cultures and customs, Rokosz said. "The fur trade was active," he said.

"The mountain man era only lasted about

15 years, while the Indian (fur) trade lasted about 30 years, from 1830 to 1860." Rokosz is developing new characters. He started three years ago with the fur trader, then added the steamboat purser

This year, he's working to re-enact Thomas Tibbles, an Omaha journalist and author who lived from 1840-1928. As a teenager, Tibbles joined the abolitionists and fought the pro-slavery forces in Kansas during the mid-1850s battles known as "Bleeding Kansas." He briefly joined forces with John Brown, a militant

anti-slavery leader. '(Tibbles) escaped hanging twice, and he survived numerous bullet wounds and one attempted poisoning," Rokosz said. "He was a circuit-riding preacher, and in the end, he was a journalist.'

Tibbles became an activist for American Indian rights in the late 19th century. As assistant editor of the Omaha Herald in 1879, he helped Chief Standing Bear and the Ponca Tribe make the legal argument before the U.S. District Court that Indians were human beings.

The judge ruled that Indians are persons, with all the rights of full citizens.

"Chief Standing Bear became the first American Indian to successfully file suit against the United States government," Rokosz said.

In 1882, Tibbles married Susette "Bright Eyes" LaFlesche, a member of the Omaha tribe who had served as Standing Bear's interpreter at the trial.

Tibbles remained an active reformer during his lifetime. He ran as the Populist Party's vice presidential candidate in

Rokosz believes his re-enactments offer a special historical insight into the people connected with the unique wild and sce-

We are one of the few remaining freeflowing sections of the Missouri River," he said. "From Sioux City down to the Mississippi, it's channelized. Above Gavins Point Dam, it's impounded by the dams."

'We have seen a major change in the river's hydrology and habitat over the years, and we need to maintain this stretch," he added.

The MNRR is the only national park in eastern South Dakota and northeast Nebraska, he said. It protects the natural and cultural resources of 128 miles of undammed river for all to experience and

The public needs to know that they are living amidst and visiting a national park that is very special," he said.

last year.

"Thunderstorms can cause localized flooding even during droughts, so flood risk reduction remains a primary consideration as we progress through 2013."

South Dakota state climatologist Dennis Todey echoed many of those sentiments, warning that the drought may have eased but not ended for many areas.

"It's certainly not over from the hydroelectric perspective and also the agricultural perspective," he said. "We still have issues, especially to the west, where two or three dry weeks could turn the tide back to problems again."

Southeast South Dakota and northeast Nebraska continue to exhibit moderate to severe drought, according to the National Drought Monitor. Spring climate and drought predictions indicate ongoing drought for Nebraska through the end of the month.

Those drought conditions continue despite heavy rainfall during the past month, Todey said. Soil moisture issues remain, even in parts of South Dakota removed from drought, he said.

"We are seeing pre-existing conditions, where lower parts of the basin are carrying over the impacts of the drought from last year," he said.

The eastern part of South Dakota has experienced below-average temperatures this spring, Todey said. The forecast for the next 8 to 14 days indicates warmerthan-average temperatures and drier-thanaverage conditions. The chances remain for active weather

patterns in the coming days, he added. "There are chances for episodic heavy

rains this time of year," he said. "There are also chances for episodic flooding and some changes in stream management."

The summer should continue to be

ern part of the river basin, Todey said. Officially, predictions call for a neutral situation for La Nina and El Nino this summer. Despite the drought conditions, flood-

drier and warmer in the Plains and south-

ing could occur in the James River basin and the Missouri River tributaries, according to Scott Dummer with the National Weather Service (NWS). "The minor flooding along the James

River is occurring due to increased stream flow from the early spring," he said. "The snowmelt runoff, combined with this spring's precipitation, makes its way downstream this month, and we have had elevated stream melt."

The Corps will continue to monitor basin conditions and adjust its regulation of the reservoirs based on updated information, Farhat said.

Releases out of Gavins Point Dam are expected to increase to 23,000 cfs and average that level through the end of the month. Those releases will prevent the endangered least tern and threatened piping plover from nesting on low sandbars that would be flooded later this summer when higher releases are needed to provide navigation flows. The nesting season runs from May to late August.

Fort Randall Dam releases at Pickstown ranged from 5,000 cfs to 23,000 cfs during May, averaging 15,700 cfs. Fort Randall releases will be adjusted during June as necessary to maintain the desired elevation at Gavins Point.

The six mainstem power plants generated 608 million kilowatt hours (kWh) of electricity in May. Typical energy generation for the month of May is 687 million

The power plants are projected to generate 7.6 billion kWh of electricity this year, compared to the normal of 10 billion

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
