likes that rule, because “If you had like six or seven, you’d have almost no summer at all.”

Even with four camps, the Bucks can find things to use as motivation, Olson said.

“Last year at a team camp, I had a turnover with like 10 seconds left that cost us the game,” he said. “It sucked, but I was glad it happened then and not in February or March.”

The timing of the camps also provides teams like Yankton — and others in the Eastern South Dakota Conference (ESD) — some unique challenges, according to incoming sophomore Reid Sawatzke.

“We get so used to playing against ESD teams, so it’s nice to see new teams,” Sawatzke said. “We don’t see much zone in the ESD, but we saw it a few times (Wednesday).”

Another of the sights throughout the two camps already has

been camaraderie, Haynes said.

“We told our guys that the more time they shoot around together, they’ll start to notice how close they all become,” he said. “Hopefully that builds chemistry.”

That was a common term among camp participants, as Sawatzke later pointed out.

“It’s team chemistry, mostly,” Sawatzke said. “We’re each getting better, you can tell. We need the whole team to work on things, and this helps.”

At the end of the day, the ultimate goal is to improve on last season and reach the State Class AA Tournament, Haynes said.

“The guys took that to heart; hopefully, at least,” he said. “They understand that if you want to be good, you have to put in the work in the off-season.”

Baker Adjusting To Mount Marty Job

As the official host to the Mount Marty boys’ team camp, new men’s basketball coach Andrew Baker is staying busy in his new role.

Has the 26-year-old Baker, named to the position on May 16, settled into the job?

“As much as I can be, I guess,” he said Wednesday, smiling. “It’s been very busy with recruiting, lining up a staff and organizing this camp. There’s always something to do. It’ll all fall into place once we get closer to the fall.”

Baker’s roster for the 2013-14 is starting to fall into place, as well. He said he currently has 15 players (8 returners, 7 newcomers) and would like to eventually reach 20 — he has some offers still on the table to recruits.

BROOKINGS — The South Dakota State wrestling recruiting class for the 2013-14 season is ranked No. 6 by Amateur Wrestling News (AWN). AWN rankings incorporate many factors, including: rankings, needs and other intangibles. One of the top criteria in developing a strong recruiting class is addressing a program’s needs.

Head coach Chris Bono and the Jackrabbit wrestling coaching staff added 13 incoming student-athletes to the roster, as well as one on-campus freshman.

The incoming class includes Nate Rolert, Colin Holler, Paul Mascare-

Stadium Officials Warn Fans To Stay Off CWS Field

OMAHA, Neb. (AP) — Channeling his best Clint Eastwood, the head of the agency that operates the College World Series stadium issued a warning Wednesday to fans tempted to dash onto the field during play: “Get off my lawn.”

Roger Dixon, president of the Metropolitan Entertainment and Convention Authority, said security personnel have made it a priority this year to keep fans from disrupting games at TD Ameritrade Park.

“While we understand this may be viewed as just having fun, we want guests to understand that it is a safety and security issue and fans on the field cannot be tolerated,” Dixon said.

The CWS begins Saturday and runs through June 25 or 26.

Officials for decades have winced at beach balls floating out of the stands onto the field. But

they want to nip what has been an increasing number of fan-on-the-field incidents in recent years.

The breaking point came last year when several young fans hopped the 8-foot outfield fence in the seventh inning of Game 1 of the finals. According to media reports, six people were ticketed, including a 17-year-old girl who patted the backside of two players while grounds crew members and security personnel chased her.

Omaha city prosecutor David Smalheiser said trespassers face up to six months in jail and a \$500 fine.

New signs warning fans to stay off the field have been placed around the ballpark.

Dixon said it was discovered after the fact that plans for last year’s CWS finals incident had spread on Twitter. He said his security staff will be monitoring so-

around the sixth inning.

“I went down there and said, ‘Hey, we’re going to get a run.’ And he goes, ‘Well, if you score one, we win,’” Katz recalled. “That’s who Aaron is. He always keeps us in the game.”

The way the double-elimination College World Series is set up, LSU could pitch Nola as many as three times, and Nola said he embraces the chance to take as much responsibility for LSU’s success as the team gives him.

“I feel good about it. We’re play-

ing for everything,” Nola said. “You’re supposed to have that mentality that, ‘I’m the best.’ ... Every time I go on the mound, that’s how I think.”

Mainieri describes Bregman as player who combines supreme talent with an unsurpassed work ethic — the kind of player he finds in the batting cage, alone, at 8 a.m. on a fall Sunday, or persuading a team manager to hit him grounders when everyone else has left the stadium, and the lights are off, forcing him to field the ball in darkness.

“You can’t fake that,” Mainieri said. “He just loves it that much. ... He’s going to get every accolade you can get in your time here and you can’t do that without talent, but unfortunately some kids that

have a lot of talent don’t have that kind of work ethic.”

Bregman has hit .380 this season with six home runs, 18 doubles, seven triples and 52 runs batted in. His 104 hits are an LSU freshman record. He has stolen 16 bases on 17 attempts.

He might not have come to LSU if not for a broken finger that sidelined him his senior year of high school. Bregman arrived at LSU expecting to be a difference-maker, and endeared himself to teammates by putting them first. Katz recalled standing nearby, last fall, when Bregman was asked about his goals.

“He said, ‘Get the seniors to Omaha,’” Katz recalled. “To have a freshman come in and not care about personal statistics or anything — just to help us go to Omaha and win a national championship — that’s a guy you want to play with.”
