Musicians To Offer Old-Time Tunes In Gayville

GAYVILLE — The Public Domain Tune Band, Sioux City piano player Terry Brooks, and Sioux Falls vocalist Becca Gehm take the Gayville Hall stage at 8 p.m. Saturday, June 15, at 8 p.m. for "Gayville Hall's Down-Home, Two-Hour Jazz Jam.'

A follow-up to two popular "jazz jams" at Gayville Hall last year, according to producer Doug Sharples, the show will feature "tunes that our parents and grandparents loved," including songs by Fats Waller, George Gershwin, Duke Ellington, and other greats.

The Tune Band was founded as a duo in 1979 by vocalist and guitarist Nick Schwebach and fiddler Owen DeJong, both of rural Wakonda, after the rockabilly band they played in broke up. The duo started performing early 20th-century tunes they learned from older musicians and 78 r.p.m. records.

Schwebach's vocals recall singers of the early jazz and pop era like Louis Armstrong and Jack Teagarden. Gehm, still in her 20s, adds a fresh, female spin to old-time classics. Larry Rohrer, who is part of Schwebach-and-DeJong's five-piece Poker Alice Band, plays bass, and USD jazz professor C.J. Kocher, with many professional credits in

jazz, big bands, and symphonies, plays saxophones. Guest artist Brooks, who toured Europe with the Playboy Jazz Festival and has earned many Las Vegas and Los Angeles music cred-

its, performs regularly now in Omaha.

Ecological Film To Be Shown In Vermillion

VERMILLION — The film "American Serengeti" will be screened at the Vermillion Public Library, 18 Church St., at 7 p.m. Tuesday, June 18, as part of the 2013 Eco Film Series. America's Great Plains were once a vibrant grassland ecosystem,

akin to the great savannahs of Africa. Here, a mere 200 years ago, Lewis and Clark stepped onto this fertile landscape and were awestruck by what they saw — herds of bison, packs of wolves, grizzly bears, prairie dogs and more. Since Lewis and Clark's time, many of these iconic prairie creatures have all but disappeared. Filmed over two years in stunning high-definition, "American

Serengeti" chronicles the massive restoration project and, through computer-generated imagery, will fast forward to the future when vast herds of American wildlife will roam the plains once again. The film's running time is 50 minutes.

Great Guide To Outdoor Fun

"Go Out and Play!" by Darrell Hammond, Candlewick Press, 2012. 96 pages.



Have your parents ever made you drop the video game controller and shoo'd you outside?

"Go out and play!" they probably said.
And you probably replied something like, "Play what? There's nothing to do outside!"

Well, this book of games to play outside will make both you and your parents happy. They've maybe told you about the games they used to play — Red Rover, Hopscotch, Four Square, Mother May I. Well this book includes all those oldies, but it also includes some I've never heard of and I grew up playing lots of outdoor games.

The book is broken out into sections: Tag Games, Hide-and-Seek Games, Ball Games, Team Games, Circle Games, Race Games, Other Games, and No-Rules Games. Each game tells how many people are needed to play it. It also tells how much space you will need, what ages it's best for, and the materials needed. Luckily most of those things are not hard-and-fast rules: you can fudge somewhat on the number of people, the space needed, and the ages that can play. And the



materials you will need are quite minimal, maybe some balls, sidewalk chalk, and household items or toys that you probably have on hand already.

The games range from fast and lively (Clean Your Room) to medium activity (Ring of Fire) to lounging around on the ground (Sleeping Lions).

Most games say they are for ages 5+, 8+, or All Ages. But the real beauty of these games is that teens and adults can play with the younger kids. It's a win-win for everyonekids love having their parents actually play a game with them and parents love being able to spend some fun time with their kids.

This book is actually an outreach of the website Kaboom.org, which is a nonprofit that 'envisions a great place to play within walking distance of every child in America.' You can get involved in the website by helping map out playgrounds in your city. (Looks like Yankton's are listed but they could use

The book also gives suggestions of how to help make safe places for kids to play. Some seem a little odd for our area (organize a playground watch so there's always a responsible adult at a playground) but maybe those suggestions are better suited for other

At any rate, this is a book that should make kids, parents, babysitters, and grandparents all eager to head outside and become a Snail or a Ghost or a Pickpocket or ... well, the possibilities are endless. This book will be a success if you don't finish reading it because you're too busy playing outside.

Yankton Photographer's Works On Display In Rapid City

A photographic exhibition of historic structures at the South Dakota Human Services Center (HSC), formerly Yankton State Hospital for the mentally ill, will be on display at the Dahl Arts Center in Rapid City through Aug. 14. Photographs taken by Yankton native David Jensen show the interiors of buildings that have been abandoned for decades. Many of the structures are more than a century old and made of Sioux Falls quartzite and/or Yankton cement. Many also were designed by the prominent South Dakota architect, Wallace L. Dow, and one ward for female patients, the Mead Building, was conceived by Henry W. Tomlinson, Frank Lloyd Wright's only partner.

The photographic project that Jensen began about two years ago has proven to be timely, since plans are underway to significantly alter the HSC campus. During South Dakota's 2013 legislative session, Bill 1033 was passed and signed into law by Gov. Dennis Daugaard to have some of the abandoned buildings at HSC demolished and some restored. The Mead Building will be renovated to become the new home for the Dakota Territorial

Museum in Yankton. Titled "Homage," Jensen's ex-

hibition of black and white photographs bestow haunting images of buildings that maintain prominence and dignity despite their deteriorating state. They show vestiges of a wealthy and expansionist era in South Dakota, as well as a time when mental health care was quite different from that provided today. The buildings photographed include wards, where both patients and nurses resided, and barns. The



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Yankton State Hospital was once a self-sufficient institution complete with dairy cows, orchard, farmland, laundry and services such as hairstyling and sewing. The Dahl Arts Center, man-

aged by the not-for-profit Rapid

City Arts Council, is located at 713 7th Street in Rapid City.
