graders through high school juniors, Kortan said.

"I have no idea why more than in the last few years, other than they are encouraged to try it by their Czech relatives," she said. "Almost all of our dancers, young and old, do have Czech connections. A few of our new dancers are new to the area and wanted to take part in Czech Days in some way."

A general call goes out each year for dancers, with a minimum age of recently-completed first graders, Kortan said. The dancers are assigned to groups of eight, and this year's dancers range in age from 7 to the 70s.

"This is a Czech dance that the original people performed (when they settled Tabor). They danced according to what they had done in the Old Country," she said. "We try to have the same number of males and females. This year, we had so many more girls than boys, some girls dance two nights while others dance only one night."

This year's practices began

June 11. The first week consisted of four days in the gymnasium. The past week was practiced at Sokol Park so dancers became comfortable with the performance site, along with the entrance and exit to the park.

"There aren't as many distractions in the gym as there are outside," Kortan said with a laugh.

Mildred Cimpl helped her mother, Anna Schuch, who was an originator of the Beseda Dance in Tabor. The children's dancers were started shortly thereafter. The Tabor uniforms retain a consistent, traditional look. For the women, it's a red skirt, white apron, black vest, white blouse and flowers in the hair. For the men, it's black pants, red vest, white shirts and red bowties.

The Beseda Dance contains eight different patterns, Kortan said. Two new patterns are taught each of the first four days of practice.

"I worked at the school as either a teacher or para (professional) for 40 years, so I have worked with kids," she said. "It's a joy for me to see the kids make progress on something so complicated."

City To Consider New Water Rate Structure At Monday Meeting

The Yankton City Commission will consider Monday finalizing the rate structure that will be implemented to pay for an estimated \$28 million in water system improvements.

City Finance Officer Al Viereck has adjusted the combination of a surcharge and consumption rate increase based on previous direction from commissioners. Mayor Nancy Wenande said during a media briefing Friday that she expects the commission will make a final decision on the matter during Monday's meeting.

In related matters, the commission will consider awarding a bid for Water Treatment Plant

No. 2 improvements, and it will hold a public hearing as part of applying for low-interest loans for the water system upgrades.

In other business, the commission will consider a vendor policy for the Meridian Bridge and the possibility of hiring the services of a consultant to update a plan he previously put together for the Meridian Bridge Plaza.

Also, the commission will consider establishing covenants and general conditions for the sale of surplus property south of Fire Station No. 2.

The meeting gets under way at 7 p.m. in the City of Yankton Meeting Room, located at the Technical Education Center, 1200 W. 21st St.

Wheat for July delivery fell 2.5 cents to \$6.98 a bushel; July corn fell 11.5 cents to \$6.6175 a bushel; July oats slipped 0.5 cent to \$3.9425 a bushel; while July soybeans fell 4.25 cents to \$14.9325 a bushel.

stated.

A call-in system can be used for low-risk probationers, and its use will be expanded in the coming months.

"This call-in system is a way an individual can call in on a monthly basis, answer a few questions asked by a computer and then our officer can track that and make sure they are doing what they need to do," Frieberg said.

He believes the case load in his Yankton office may grow because of presumptive probation cases.

Under the new law, offenders convicted of Class 5 and 6 felonies will be placed on probation absent overriding public safety concerns, excluding crimes of violence, sex offender registry offenses, hit and run with injury, simple assault on law enforcement and distribution of marijuana to a minor.

"If the judge does not feel they should go on probation, he or she has to state on the record the reasons why the subject is going to the penitentiary or not going on probation," Frieberg said.

As part of the process, the court services area at the Yankton County Courthouse and Safety Center will need to be re-modeled.

The Yankton County Commis-

sion is currently seeking bids for splitting a conference room into two offices.

"What is going to happen is our new drug court program will use those two new offices," Frieberg said. "Our new officer will take the other office that is available."

Once that is done, there is no room in the immediate court services area to expand, he added.

"I don't know if there will be any other full-time equivalents hired down the road or not, but we will be struggling for room," Frieberg said.

The new laws will have a positive effect, he believes.

"The goal is not to have people go to the penitentiary," Frieberg said. "If there are more tools for us to help redirect someone's life so they don't have to go to the penitentiary, it helps our job."

"Part of the deal with the call-in system and our new officer is that it will help free up other officers to look at their medium- and high-risk offenders," he continued. "The low-risk offenders don't need as much concentration. They've found that if you over-supervise people who don't need it, it isn't good for them. They might actually violate more. The high-risk offenders, those are the ones you need to spend your time with, provide services for and direct."

The City of Yankton is reminding residents that rummage or yard sales signs, advertising signs, posters or notices of any kind must be posted on private property.

For the safety of all drivers and pedestrians signs cannot be posted in boulevards, attached to utility poles, street signs, street trees, light poles, or be placed in parks.

A good general rule is to keep signs to the inside (house side) of the public sidewalk or 15 feet from the roadside curb if there is no sidewalk. Signs posted in the public right of way will be removed.
