Young Students To Take Flight At Summer Camp

BROOKINGS — Summer learning at South Dakota State University will reach new heights July 14-17 when high school students go beyond a typical classroom experience to receive hands-on aeronautics training at ACE Camp. ACE, (Aerospace Career and Education), Camp introduces students to careers in aerospace, aviation and the science used to operate them. "ACE camp has been instrumental over the past 20 years in helping students make informed choices when considering career paths in aviation," said Cody Christensen, camp coordinator and certified flight instructor. During the four-day, three-night camp, students construct and launch model rockets, learn how to navigate an aircraft, tour an air traffic control facility and receive one-on-one flight in-

struction behind the controls of a Cessna 172 airplane. Campers also will tour the South Dakota Air National Guard headquarters in Sioux Falls for an up-close look at the F-16 Falcon jet fighter and travel to Watertown to learn about aviation maintenance and repair at Lake Area Technical Institute. Since its inception in 1992, the program has drawn more than 300 students from across South Dakota and other states, including Iowa, Minnesota, Nebraska, North Dakota and Wyoming as well as international countries. ACE Camp is open to young people going into grade nine through 2013 high

school graduates. The tuition cost is \$300, which includes lodging in an SDSU residence hall, meals, activity fees, transportation during camp and flight experience at the controls. "Young women, minorities and those with disabilities are encouraged to apply," said Christensen. "Camp scholarships are also available to qualified applicants." Camp enrollment is limited to 30 students and will fill on a first-come, first-serve basis. Yankton's Dogs 'R' Us 4-H group will host their first Pet Palooza on Saturday, June 29, at the 4H Fairgrounds from 10 a.m.-1 p.m. The event is replacing Heartland Humane Society's Animal Fair traditionally held in May. Grant Kramer, treasurer for the group, said Dogs 'R' Us asked Heartland Humane Society to support their efforts after learning the Animal Fair had been cancelled. "We became aware that the Animal Fair had been cut from the shelters budget and we wanted to be able to continue a like-minded event for pet lovers in Yankton," Kramer said. The event will include a registration booth to join the 4-H Club, a Meet 'n' Greet booth with available pets from Heartland Humane Society, fingerprinting for youth, a petting zoo, agility courses, guest appearances by the Yankton Police K-9 unit and pet contests. Kramer said expected 4-H animals to be on site will include dogs, kittens, lambs, piglets, donkeys and more. Lunch for a nominal fee will be provided by Yankton County 4-H. All vaccinated pets are welcomed on leash. The event is free to public. "We hope to see a great turnout for the pet contest at 11:30 a.m. and we have a lot in store," Kramer said. "This event is for anyone who enjoys pets or wants to learn more about 4-H, the humane society or animals."

Mowing Of State ROW Begins July 10

PIERRE — The South Dakota Department of Transportation reminds landowners that mowing of the right of way may not begin east of the Missouri River before July 10. Mowing of the right of way in Gregory, Lyman and Tripp counties could begin on June 15. If a person who is not the abutting landowner wishes to mow the interstate highway right of way, he must apply for a permit and include a waiver signed by the abutting landowner. The Permit to Occupy the Right of Way application is located on the DOT website at <http://sddot.com/resources/forms/>. The department may mow medians and areas within the rights of way prior to July 10 to control noxious weeds and provide increased safety to the traveling public.

and Hong Kong Secretary for Justice Rimsky Yuen, Hong Kong officials never raised any issues regarding sufficiency of the U.S. request, a Justice spokesperson said. A State Department official said the United States was in touch through diplomatic and law enforcement channels with countries that Snowden could travel through or to, reminding them that Snowden is wanted on criminal charges and reiterating Washington's position that Snowden should only be permitted to travel back to the U.S. The Justice Department said it would "pursue relevant law enforcement cooperation with other countries where Mr. Snowden may be attempting to travel." The White House would only say that President Barack Obama had been briefed on the developments by his national security advisers. Russia's state ITAR-Tass news agency and Interfax cited an unnamed Aeroflot airline official as saying Snowden was on the plane that landed Sunday afternoon in Moscow. Upon his arrival, Snowden did not leave Moscow's Sheremetyevo Airport. One explanation could be that he wasn't allowed; a U.S. official said Snowden's passport had been revoked, and special permission from Russian authorities would have been needed. "It's almost hopeless unless we find some ways to lean on them," said Rep. Peter King, R-N.Y. The Russian media report said Snowden intended to fly to Cuba on Monday and then on to Caracas, Venezuela. U.S. lawmakers scoffed. "The freedom trail is not exactly China-Russia-Cuba-Venezuela, so I hope we'll chase him to the ends of the earth, bring him to justice and let the Russians know there'll be consequences if they harbor this guy," said Sen. Lindsey Graham, R-S.C. With each suspected flight, efforts to secure Snowden's return to the United States appeared more complicated if not impossible. The United States does not have an extradition treaty with Russia, but does with Cuba, Venezuela and Ecuador. Even with an extradition agreement though, any country could give Snowden a political exemption.
