Police Tase Uncooperative Subject Monday

Yankton police officers tased a man Wednesday afternoon after they say he became uncooperative. According to Chief Brian Paulsen, officers were called to do a welfare check on the man at 1:43 p.m. in the 400 block of Linn Street. Upon arrival, officers engaged the male subject in the doorway of the residence. Paulsen said the man was experiencing mental health issues. Officers attempted to take the subject into custody, but he retreated into the residence and returned with a knife. When officers ordered the male to drop the knife, he complied. However, the subject again became uncooperative, and a Taser was used to subdue him. The man was transported by ambulance to Avera Sacred Heart Hospital for treatment of self-inflicted wounds not related to his arrest. Paulsen said the subject will eventually be transported to the South Dakota Human Services Center. He declined to release the name of the individual and doesn't anticipate any criminal charges will be filed in the matter.

Sentencing Set In Springfield Case

TYNDALL — An Aug. 7 sentencing has been set for the Niobrara, Neb., couple convicted of burning down their Springfield restaurant. A Bon Homme County jury returned guilty verdicts Friday against 62-year-old Charles Johnson and 56-year-old Kimberly Johnson. The couple, accused of setting fire to Libby's Steakhouse to collect insurance money, was convicted of felony arson and reckless burning, both Class 4 felonies. The October 2010 fire also destroyed another downtown Springfield business and damaged a third. No one was injured in the blaze. Judge Glen Eng continued the Johnsons' bond, and they are to remain in contact with their attorneys, according to Joanne Balvin, the

Bon Homme County clerk of courts. Yankton attorney Creighton Thurman represents Kimberly Johnson, while Menno attorney Ken Bertsch represents Charles Johnson. While convicted of the same charges, the Johnsons could receive different sentences depending on factors taken into consideration for each individual, according to Deputy Attorney General Katie Mallory, who prosecuted the case with Bon Homme County State's Attorney Lisa Rothschild. The sentencing will be held at the Bon Homme County courthouse in Tyndall. The Johnsons each face up to 20 years in prison and \$40,000 in fines.

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that's unfolding and innovators are changing the business, the federal government steps in and mandates it through a federal law, and it takes away how the innovators get to show up and change things. It also takes away the freedom of how citizens will be able to choose their healthcare." Bosworth added that the Affordable Care Act is a perfect example of too much involvement by the federal government, something she would hope to change should she choose to run for office. "The growth of our economy will be proportional to how much the federal government impacts that industry. The higher the government gets, the lesser the economy for that industry will be," she said. "And the job I have will be a federal job by the end of the decade if we don't have some serious leaders show up in the U. S. Senate and keep our government from taking over yet another industry in our country."

While she may not have experience in politics, Bosworth said she does have experience standing up for what she believes. The physician had to fight to retain her medical license last year following a reprimand by the state medical board for employing a physician's assistant who wasn't licensed to practice. She also became involved in a dispute over Medicaid claims in which a settlement was reached but no wrongdoing was admitted. "I stood to say, 'I look to serve patients first,'" she said. "That's how you create a good business in medicine. I didn't care if it was Medicaid or the best-insured patients in front of me, I gave them the best care. And they attacked me for giving too good of care for Medicaid." Despite some who believe her troubles with the medical board could hinder a run for office, Bosworth believes it should actually benefit her. "I don't think you could provide a better platform to say it's not about the money, the prestige, or the title of being senator that I do this for," she said. "I'm doing this because South Dakota needs a voice."

That platform would also include a self-imposed two-term limit, she said. "The idea is that you'll go to the U.S. Senate and be there forever and get re-elected again and again and that you'll make a difference. But the chances that will get you the outcomes you're looking for is so close to zero," she said. "That's not how humans work. There needs to be a deadline. You need to say the words 'I failed' if what you are trying to do in that time doesn't end up being accomplished. And if you fail, you need to leave so someone else can do it." Should she decide to run, Bosworth added she would be a good companion to Sen. Thune during her time in office. "He has some great ideas, and he really needs a partner next to him with great ideas and passion to fuel his ideas and to be his wingman," she said. "He doesn't need a shadow who hangs out behind him and is a yes man. He needs somebody who has strengths of their own and can show up at the table and say, 'As a pair, we can do amazing things.'"
