





band reportedly visited the bar and asked management to turn down the volume, the actions border on bullying, stated Terry Winter, Bailey's brother and a homeowner in the 400 block of Linn Street.

"You feel very helpless under those circumstances, so I hope the commission will take very seriously this complaint and those of us who are speaking to it," he told the commission. "I think it needs to be addressed. I think you do them — and a lot more of your citizens than you know — a disservice if it continues as it is."

However, Happy Hourz also had a supporter present at the City Commission meeting.

"I realize that the music is loud and some of us don't like loud music," said Kathy Church, who owns a business and lives in the 300 block of Douglas Avenue across the street from the bar. "It's very hard to make a business work. It's hard to get people to come to your establishment. I have nothing but kudos for (Happy Hourz) and what he has done to downtown Yankton. Downtown Yankton is not a surviving location, and I think he has brought a lot of life."

"I hope you don't say, 'You can't do this anymore,'" she added. "I think that would be a grave disservice to the people of Yankton that enjoy stuff like this. I'm not a bar hopper, but I love to listen to the music."

Church said the music has never kept her awake at night.

Happy Hourz owner Neal Anderson was present during the City Commission meeting but refrained from speaking.

When contacted Thursday by the *Press & Dakotan*, he declined to comment on the matter other than to say he has been cooperative with police requests to turn down the volume of the music.

When contacted by residents with complaints, Yankton Police Chief Brian Paulsen confirmed for the *Press & Dakotan* that his officers have visited with Happy Hourz staff and the volume was lowered.

He said the case is some-

what unique compared to typical noise complaints in that the establishment is in an area zoned for live music and has a license for it.

Paulsen said it is difficult for officers to determine what is an acceptable volume.

"We can make the request but don't have a lot of options if he doesn't turn it down," he added. "This is a pretty common issue with most jurisdictions."

The department has sent a report to the city attorney and the Yankton County state's attorney requesting a recommendation on charges based on Bailey's formal complaint. Paulsen said no response has been received as of yet.

"It really comes down to the rights of a business to operate and the personal rights of the complainant," he stated. "It will be extremely difficult to prosecute this case if the neighbor across the street says it doesn't bother them."

City Attorney Dave Hosmer told the commission during Monday's meeting that the disturbing the peace ordinance is vague in his opinion.

"Unreasonable (noise) to whom?" he asked. "My recommendation is that we enact an ordinance that would have limits on decibels so you can identify the level of volume, and everybody would know what it is."

Mayor Nancy Wenande said the commission is having staff examine the issue. Perhaps an ordinance could address decibel levels or require a special permit for outdoor music, she said.

"What we also want to look at is, how would something like this apply to Riverboat Days, Ribfest or the 150th we had in the park?" Wenande said. "I think we could do something that would apply to those specific situations, as well."

Paulsen said there is no easy solution to the conflict.

"The effects are much more than the commission changing the ordinance," he stated. "This is about the vitalization of the downtown district versus tranquility of the surrounding neighborhood. Both sides have valid concerns, but the outcome most certainly will be challenged in our courts."
