The Book Shelf **Books Serve Up Monstrous Fun**



What could be more fun than monsters? Especially baby monsters? Here are two books with two very different baby monsters

"I Loathe You" is a takeoff of the standard sweet picture book where a young child asks his parent how much they love him. In those books the parent proceeds to tell the child she loves him to the moon and back or more than strawberry shortcake. Little Monster in this book asks Big Monster not how much Big loves him, but how much Big loathes him.

Big Monster throws out a couple things to let Little know just how much Big loathes him-like more than garbage in a dump or splinters sticking in his rump. Not to be outdone, Little says he loathes Big even more than bellyaches, which impresses Big. Big comes back with lovely things like fuzzy mold on cheese or lobsters pinching him-Big loathes Little even more than all of these.


But then Little throws in a curve-what if he accidentally says "please" or "thank you" sometime? Or what if he stops chew-



ing chairs? Will Big still love him? The baby monster in "The Baby That Roared" is a bit more, well, monsterly

than Little Monster in the first book. Mr. and Mrs. Deer don't have a baby to

read too and cuddle. One day a baby shows up on their doorstep. Mrs. Deer cuddles the baby right away, even though Mr. Deer thinks the baby looks a bit odd. As soon as Mrs. Deer put it into bed, it lets out a loud "ROOAARR!" They try to feed it but it doesn't want any of the food they offer.



So they call wise Uncle Duncan, sure that he'll know what to do with the baby. When he gets there he advises them to feed the baby warm milk. When they come back with the warm milk, Uncle Duncan has disappeared ...

When they notice an odor coming from the baby, they call Auntie Agnes who comes right over. She promptly sends Mr. and Mrs. Deer out for diapers. But when they return with the diapers, Auntie Agnes has disappeared too ..

These picture books are for ages 4-7, but adults will enjoy reading them to their own little monsters. The illustrations are fun, the ending to Loathe is reassuring, and the ending to Roared is clever. All in all, both are monstrously enjoyable books.

Everharts Star At Hay Country Jamboree July 6

GAYVILLE — Iowa musician Bob Everhart made six albums on the legendary Folkways label, famous for its recordings of the most important folk artists in America, and was an early pioneer in the Branson, Mo., musical scene, leading the shows at Silver Dollar City. Everhart and his wife Sheila

will join John and Susan Mc-Neill and the Wiedrich Brothers at Gayville Hall on Saturday, July 6, at 8 p.m. for the venue's monthly musical variety show, "The Hay Country Jamboree.

Every Jamboree features three or more musical acts on stage together trading songs and humor, according to producer Doug Sharples. The shows are two-hours long, including a short intermission midway, and are presented in an alcohol-free, family-friendly setting.

Everhart was a regular per-former at the "Louisiana Hayride" and was the host for seven years of a public television show he helped create, "Old Time Country Music." In 1976, he founded the National Old Time Country Music and Bluegrass Festival, now staged in LeMars, which draws thousands annually to western

Iowa and celebrates its 38th year in August. He and Sheila have performed in more than 30 countries, becoming ambassadors for America's old-time music around the world.

The McNeills, who have performed together since the 1970s, were inducted into the South Dakota Country Music Hall of Fame last year, and have been Gayville Hall's country music hosts since 2001.

The teenaged brothers Ashur and Dawson Wiedrich of Wakonda have been harmonizing together since childhood. Self-taught musicians, they accompany themselves on guitar and drums respectively and will be making their first appearance at the Jamboree...
