Firefighters Called To Morgen Square

Yankton firefighters were summoned to a call at a business in Morgen's Square in the 1100 block of Broadway Friday afternoon.

A fire call was received at 4:15 p.m. after a commercial popcorn popper caught fire in the back room area of a medical supply business. Smoke filled the area while the fire moved into the wall area, forcing firefighters to tear out the wall and insulation, even though an employee at the business was able to knock down much of the fire with a fire extinguisher.

There was minor smoke damage done, but there was considerable soot.

Firefighters were concerned because the business has several oxygen cylinders on the premises.

Surrounding businesses were notified of a possible evacuation, but no evacuation was necessary.

gear for his teams and \$500 for additional team expenses.

"It's very humbling and very exciting," Buffington said about the honor.

Nominations for the award are placed mostly through social media messages, the first of which was sent to the Brooks Running Company via Facebook by Gayville-Volin cross country team member Laura Nelson and her mother, Rita.

"Coach Buffington has not only inspired the athletes that he coaches, but also other students," Rita said. "It doesn't matter if they're on his teams or not, he still helps them build character that will help them with the rest of their lives."

Rita said the coach has helped her daughter immensely by simply giving her more manageable steps to achieve her goals.

"He's always able to break down a larger goal into littler chunks," she said. "This way they can still see their vision without being overwhelmed."

Following the Nelsons' nomination, many current and former students and their parents joined in and sent in their nominations as well.

"The nominating process was fun because there were a lot of athletes and former athletes telling stories about me," Buffington said. "It was fun to reconnect with some of those people, and I'm very thankful for all the people that helped me get to this point."

Many of the nominations centered around the coach's effort to create a community of runners in and around his hometown of Gayville. This has included rallying the community to build a new track, as well as inspiring elementary

students to take up running.

"A lot of it is just persistence and keeping the same message out there to be active and to stay active," Buffington said.

Also mentioned by many of Buffington's nominators was his inspirational one-liners that he offers to his athletes. Known as "Buffisms," these nuggets of wisdom include: "It only hurts when you take your eyes off the finish line," and "Focus on the prize, not the price."

"They're little things like that that I use a lot to encourage them," Buffington said.

He added that he has received many ideas and inspiration of his own from his numerous peers and past assistants. The coach credits much of his recent success to his current staff of Tom Rice, Matt Malloy and Gene Bormann, as well as girls' head track coach Jeremiah Dibley.

"The teaching and coaching and support staffs at Gayville-Volin really put a lot into their students' lives on a daily basis," Buffington said. "In short, I get my inspiration and motivation every day from the people I work with and the students and parents we work for."

The voting period for this year's most inspiring coach is currently open and will run until July 21. To vote, visit www.facebook.com/brook-running. The winner will be announced on Aug. 7.

Even if Buffington doesn't win the award, Rita Nelson said she is pleased that the coach is being honored for the amount of work he has put in for such a long period of time.

"We're benefiting from his experience now, but I know he's inspired a lot of athletes during the 30 years he's spent coaching," she said. "It's nice he's getting recognized for it."

- Avon voters Tuesday defeated a proposal to allow Sunday off-sale beer and approved a \$75,000 bond issue that will help fund a new lagoon system needed to meet Environmental Protection Agency requirements.
- A local radio station is in the process of being purchased by a Sioux City, Iowa, corporation. William F. Turner, bankruptcy trustee for Oyate, Inc., which owns KOHU-FM, Yankton, said Monday that Flagship Communications, Inc., has offered to purchase the station for a total of \$599,000.

Wakonda Project Gets \$529K Loan

PIERRE — Gov. Dennis Daugaard announced that the state Board of Water and Natural Resources has approved a \$529,000 low-interest loan from the Clean Water State Revolving Fund for Wakonda to replace a lift station and inspect its wastewater collection system.

The loan includes \$195,000 in principal forgiveness, which leaves a \$334,000 loan repayment. Loan terms are 3 percent for 20 years.

"I am pleased to announce that Wakonda will receive this assistance," said Gov. Daugaard. "These funds will help Wakonda make necessary improvements to its wastewater collection system and determine priority areas for future projects."

In addition to replacing the lift station, the project will include conducting a video inspection of the town's wastewater collection system to determine the condition of the collection lines and identify problem areas.

The funding package will cover the estimated cost of the project.

The Clean Water State Revolving Fund Program provides low-interest loans for wastewater and storm water projects. Principal forgiveness is a subsidy option that results in a reduced loan repayment amount for the borrower.

The board met Thursday and Friday in Pierre.
