Gazelles Finish Fourth At State

SIOUX FALLS — It had been four years since a Yankton Gazelles squad stood on the awards stand at a state track. To do it, the Gazelles had to do something they hadn't done in a lot longer.

claiming the boys' crown. "We were optimistic that, if

we could put things together, we could still make it happen,' said Yankton head coach Luke Youmans. "We knew it would come down to every last point, and that the 4-by-4 (1600 relay) could be a game-changer. "And it was."

Yankton beat out Eastern South Dakota Conference champions Brandon Valley for the fourth and final spot on the podium, edging the Lynx by 1.5 points. While Brandon Valley won the 1600 relay, the Gazelles' fourth place finish was enough to hold Brandon Valley off.

"This had all the dramatics that you want in a state meet," Youmans said. "You had to compete from beginning to end.

As they had several times during the final month of the season, seniors played key roles for the Gazelles, including an individual champion and another individual medal. Yankton also had one or two seniors on each of the four relays.

'That's been the story all year, how improved our sen-iors have been," Youmans said. 'They took it to a whole new level.

Annie Kruse highlighted the Yankton seniors' efforts on Saturday, winning the 1600 in 5:05.18. Sophomore Savannah Woods finished 10th in 5:24.49, while eighth grader Madison McClure was 19th in 5:39.02.

Kruse was happy to go out on a victory after finishing second in the 3200 and helping the Gazelles to third in the 3200 relay on Friday.

"It was very hot (Friday), then doing the 4-by-8 and sitting out in the heat took its toll. I could feel the energy draining. I wasn't happy with my two-mile because of those conditions," she said. "I had to change my attitude. Once I stepped onto the track, I told myself that I was a strong runner. I needed to feel that throughout the race.' Kruse led the first two laps, but was passed by Stevens' Tamara Ĝorman, the 3200 champ from Friday, in the third lap. Gorman surged at the start of the fourth and final lap, but Kruse matched, then surpassed Gorman's kick. "I was trying to run my own race, but I knew I couldn't lose contact with her," Kruse said. "I stayed within sight of her, and that really helped me push

Kruse will compete at Howard Wood Field again, as she will compete in track and cross country in Sioux Falls at Augustana, but she was happy with how she ended her prep career on that track.

"It feels really awesome," Kruse aid. "This whole track season has been such an amazing experience, with highs and lows. It was great to finish on a high note."


Senior Hailey Luken opened Saturday's competition for YHS with a fourth place finish in the 100-meter hurdles (15.17). Luken was one of three Gazelle

"It's been a long time, but this is a great way to end," Bertram said at the South Dakota State Track Meet at Howard Wood Field in Sioux Falls.

Bertram — a Black Hills State basketball recruit — was part of the Huskies' champion medley relay squad during her eighth-grade year, back in 2010.

Since then, she took fifth place in the 200 during her freshman year, missed her sophomore year with an injury, and took fifth place a year ago as a junior.

And just like that, Bertram's high school career came to a successful close.

"It's awesome, but kind of surreal," she said. "It's my last race ever."

Earlier Saturday, Bertram finished second in the 100 with a time of 12.78, behind Belle Fourche eighth-grader Shayla Howell (12.68).

Then came the 200, which Bertram won with a clocking of 26.73, but not without a battle first.

As she came around the turn, she was in a neck-andneck battle with Miranda Velgersdyk of Sioux Falls Christian.

Not to mention a stiff wind blowing at her.

"I knew I had to pump my arms hard," Bertram said. "I saw the line and went for it.

She wasn't about to let her goal of a state title slip away in the final meters, Bertram added — referencing the team vs. individual aspect of the sport.

"It's a team sport and I love that part of it, but you can do something on your own." she said. "And that was something
