Car Chase Ends In Arrest

A 17-year-old male was apprehended late Tuesday night after a vehicle pursuit through Yankton that reached speeds of approximately 80 mph. According to Lt. Mike Burgeson of the Yankton Police Department, an officer observed a vehicle speeding in the 1000 block of Broadway Avenue. "The officer" turned around and tried to get the driver to stop," he stated. "There was a pursuit." The suspect vehicle

continued south on Broadway Avenue and turned west on Eighth Street. The pursuit ended when the vehicle entered a field to the west of West City Limits Road along Eighth Street. "The suspect" was taken to the hospital after the pursuit for evaluation," Burgeson said. "He had no injuries." The 17-year-old will be charged with eluding law enforcement, he stated. CHICAGO (AP) — Grain futures were mostly higher Wednesday on the Chicago Board of Trade. Wheat for July delivery rose 2 cents to \$6.1450 a bushel; July corn was 2 cents lower at 4.5625 a bushel; July oats were 1.75 cents higher at \$3.6075 a bushel; while July soybeans rose 1.25 cents to \$14.8250 a bushel. Beef was higher and pork lower on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange. August live cattle rose .10 cent to \$1.4017 a pound; August feeder cattle was .47 cent higher at \$1.9877 a pound; while July lean hogs fell .80 cent to \$1.2150 a pound.

Stocks rose modestly Wednesday, erasing an early decline, as investors waited to hear from the European Central Bank on Thursday. Policymakers from Europe's central bank are meeting to decide whether or not to lower the eurozone's key interest rate in an effort to further stimulate Europe's economy. Students do not have to enroll, register or qualify for free or reduced meal benefits to participate. Any child that wants to participate can simply come to the Webster School Gym. Webster School is located at 317 East Seventh Street.
