For years I told people never to do prenuptial agreements. I always said if you love your money more than you love your spouse, then you're too immature and selfish to be married.

However, I've changed my tune on this subject a little bit recently. When one or two wealthy people get married, the problems that can arise usually have nothing to do with those two people. The problem is that it can invite a lot of crazy into your lives from the outside. Whether it's a parent, cousin or child, sometimes people start feeling a sense of entitlement when wealth is suddenly thrust into the picture.

from 60 countries. They will be supported by a similar number of team management and family members. The tournament schedule will include an official practice period, three days of qualification and eliminations, and two days of spectator finals.

In addition, the event is seen by just under 1 billion television and Internet viewers, Cull said.

The news of the tournament has eclipsed the fact that the Yankton archery center still has some big events to execute this summer, according to Cull.

From July 30 through Aug. 3, it will host the NFAA Outdoor Nationals, and Aug. 4-8, it will be home of the World Field Championships. He said those tournaments will draw approximately 500 people from an estimated 30 countries.

"It's interesting how we've evolved," Cull said. "We're getting better at hosting these tournaments."

He recalled Wednesday when he decided that Yankton could realistically host the World Youth Championships. The last time the bi-annual event was hosted in the United States was in 2009 at Ogden, Utah, near Salt

Lake City. Since then, it has been held in Poland and China.

"I didn't even consider this bid until somebody mentioned to me a runway problem in Salt Lake City and the fact there are only two international flights per day," Cull stated. "I thought, 'This is Salt Lake City, 2 million people — there are not only two flights per day.'"

However, he discovered that 80-90 percent of the competitors in the World Youth Championships had a connecting flight to Salt Lake City from another hub in the United States.

"Once I heard that, I knew we could do this," Cull said. "It was simple. You could fly into Sioux City, Sioux Falls or Omaha. The whole thing was solved in my mind. I had just been afraid that they would fly into Minneapolis or Omaha and then have to get here, and in that case it wasn't going to happen."

A local organizing committee has been created to plan for the logistics of the event, which include finding lodging, food and transportation.

For example, arrangements have been made to have visitors stay in the dorms at Mount Marty College and area hotels.

Former Yankton mayor Nancy Wenande will be the event manager.

"We want to make sure everybody understands this is not just about Yankton," she

said. "It's about the entire state."

The expectation is that once the tournament ends, participants will have the option to take a whirlwind tour of South Dakota's tourism attractions.

However, much of the pressure will be on Yankton.

"This puts Yankton on a whole other level," Schramm said. "This is way beyond anything we've ever done before. It's going to take a great deal of coordination just to get the community prepared for this event. We need to get our business community ready to deal with international visitors. We get those visitors now, but we have to be ready for the scale they will be in the community. It's going to be a huge opportunity for us."

Activities for the hundreds of young people will have to be planned, whether its boating, shopping, cultural events or other offerings.

Nelson pointed out that the event will also draw the interest of people who sell archery goods.

"There will be lots of opportunities to contact and meet with people who are manufacturing and doing those types of things," she said.

Along with other economic development officials, Nelson has worked on the concept of an archery industrial park on Yankton's east side that would include

archery-related businesses.

"I think this will be a great opportunity to showcase and show them what Yankton has to offer," Nelson said. "They'll be here for a period of time that is more than a quick look."

Carda said Yankton officials have been doing the groundwork for a tournament like this and potential business opportunities for several years by attending archery trade shows and events.

"Ten years ago, who would have ever thought this would have been here?" he said. "The NFAA moving to Yankton gave us such a great opportunity to put ourselves on the map."

Added Cull, "Believe me, (archery-related businesses are) going to come. People say, 'Why South Dakota?' Well, they're going to come and see why."

Nelson said this teamwork to build Yankton as an archery community would never have happened without Cull.

"I haven't met too many people in my life who are as passionate about a sport or activity (as Cull)," she said. "This is very exciting for us, and it's exciting to support Bruce."
