The Bookworm ... For Kids

Timely Tales Of Troubled Times


You've asked a hundred times. Everybody but you has the latest gadget, though you've begged your parents to buy it for you. Grandma even knows you want it and you still don't have it, which really stinks... so imagine being homeless, in hand-me-downs, and hungry.

Then read "American Adventures: Troubled Times.'

This may sound familiar to you: the economy goes bad, people lose their iobs, then they lose their homes. Yes, it happened a few years ago — and it also happened in the 1930s during this country's Great Depression.

Back then, people lost so much but there was much to be thankful for, too. In this book's first story, "The Lucky Star" by Judy Young, illustrated by Chris Ellison, 10-year-old Ruth was sad. Her school had closed because there was no money to keep it open, and Ruth loved school. Every night, her mother claimed that the stars each represented something to feel good about, but Ruth wasn't feeling very lucky until she realized that her mother's idea wasn't half-baked.

Rudy Phillips hated that his father



couldn't find a job. He saw the despair in Pa's eyes and he knew how he could help. In "Rudy Rides the Rails" by Dandi Daley Mackall, illustrated by Chris Ellison, Rudy told his parents that he was going to California. It wouldn't be easy, but at least there'd be one less mouth to feed at home.

From Akron, Ohio, Rudy jumped on a train headed West. He found odd jobs in Illinois. He panhandled in Iowa. Pa always said to take care of self and family first — but wasn't there someone who'd take care of a skinny, hungry boy?

And finally, what would you do to

Man's Daughter" by Sonia Levitin, illustrated by Guy Porfirio, Hanna is teased because of her father's new job. When they left the Old Country, he said there'd be streets of gold in America. So what's the shame in making a living by seizing opportunity?

You know how it's easier to fully grasp a story when you put yourself in it? That's what happens when children read "American Adventures: Troubled Times," because the main characters in each of these short stories are kids just like them.

Poverty, make-do attitudes, isolation, and immigrant struggles are depicted well in this book and because of that, I don't doubt that modern kids will understand the history and hardships depicted here. It helps that each author adds historical information following their tales, and richly-evocative illustrations accompany them.

However, while the focus is on the Great Depression and its aftermath, there seemed to be more to this book. I couldn't help but notice that, though it's about what happened nearly 80 vears ago, the situations compare to what many families face today.

This is an excellent book for young historians, biography-lovers, or kids who'll be in need of something good to read this summer. Tell your 7-to-10year-old about it, and "American Adventures: Troubled Times" may be something they'll ask for.

L.A. Saxophonist And Classic **Tunes At Gayville June 14**

GAYVILLE — The Public Domain Tune Band and talented guests, including Los Angeles saxophonist Roger Neumann, Sioux City piano player Terry Brooks, and Sioux Falls vocalist Becca Gehm, take the stage in Gayville on Saturday, June 14, at 8 p.m.for 'Gayville Hall's Big Time, Two-Hour Jazz Jam

The show will feature "tunes that our parents and grandparents loved," according to producer Doug Sharples, including songs by such great American songwriters as Fats Waller, Duke Ellington, and George and Ira

Gershwin. The Tune Band was founded as a duo in 1979 by vocalist and guitarist Nick Schwebach and fiddler Owen DeJong, both of rural Wakonda, in order to perform early 20th-century tunes they learned from 78 rpm. records and older musicians.'

Schwebach's vocals recall iconic vocalists of the early jazz era like Louis Armstrong and Jack Teagarden. Gehm will add a fresh, female spin to old-time classics.

Larry Rohrer, who is part of Schwebachand-DeJong's five-piece band Poker Alice, plays bass with the Tune Band, and USD jazz professor C.J. Kocher, who has performed behind pop stars, in big bands, and jazz combos, plays saxophones.

Guest star Roger Neumann brings the "Big-Time" to the show for the third year in a

row. He plays the tenor, soprano and baritone saxophones, flute, and clarinet and has performed with Woody Herman, the Lee Castle/Jimmy Dorsey band, Ray Anthony, Les Brown, Bob Crosby, the Beach Boys, and many others.

His music has been featured in the Showtime movies "Atlantis." "Three Men and a Little Lady," and "Mumford." He appeared on-screen in the theatrical movies "La Bamba," "My Favorite Year," and "For the Boys." He has written music for Buddy Rich, Count Basie, Ray Charles, and Jerry Garcia.' He has also written arrangements and compositions for the T.V. series "The Young and the Restless," "Moonlighting," "Hollywood Housewives," and "My Favorite Martian."

Born in North Dakota, raised in northwest Iowa, and educated at Morningside College in Sioux City and the Berkley School of Music in Boston. Neumann was honored at the 20th Annual Jazz Awards in Los Angeles in 2002, receiving "the jazz composer and arranger of the year" award.

Pianist Brooks, a Sioux City native, has performed in Europe and earned many Los Angeles and Las Vegas credits in the shows of Bill Cosby, Whoopi Goldberg, Don Rickles, and others.
