Missouri National Recreational River, the only national park in the northeast Nebraska-southeast South Dakota area, offers a variety of programs for the whole family this weekend.

- Saturday, June 7, 10 a.m.-2 p.m., Niobrara State Park — "Discover the Real Missouri River": The Missouri National Recreational River Mobile Ranger Station will be set up in the swimming pool parking lot for visitors to explore. In addition, rangers will offer demonstrations and activities including the Missouri River stream table, a soundscape hike and "Frogs and Other Friends," a program on local amphibians. Kids can earn a Junior Ranger patch by completing activities. The program is free; state park admission fees apply.
- Sunday, June 8, 10 a.m.-noon, Lewis & Clark Visitor Center at Gavins Point Dam — "Pelts & Profits": A ranger and a fur trader from the 1850s will display items offered to the plains tribes and some of the pelts they would have traded. Kids can learn some Plains Sign language and make a deal with the trader.

BOARD OF TRADE

CHICAGO (AP) — Grain futures were mostly higher Friday on the Chicago Board of Trade. Wheat for July delivery rose 12.50 cents to \$6.1825 a bushel; July corn was 10 cents higher at 4.59 a bushel; July oats were .50 cent higher at \$3.5675 a bushel; while July soybeans fell 3.50 cents to \$14.57 a bushel.

Beef mixed and pork was higher on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange. August live cattle fell .02 cent to \$1.4130 a pound; August feeder cattle was .70 cent higher at \$2.0052 a pound; while July lean hogs rose 2.80 cents to \$1.2497 a pound.

WALL ST. RECAP

The Standard & Poor's 500 index notched its eighth record high in the last 10 trading days Friday after the U.S. government reported more healthy job growth in May. U.S. employers added 217,000 jobs last month, in line with forecasts. The unemployment rate stayed put at 6.3 percent. The Dow Jones industrial average rose 88.17 points, also 0.5 percent, to 16,924.28. The S&P 500 index gained 8.98 points, or 0.5 percent, to close at 1,949.44. The Nasdaq composite climbed 25.17 points, 0.6 percent, to 4,321.40.
