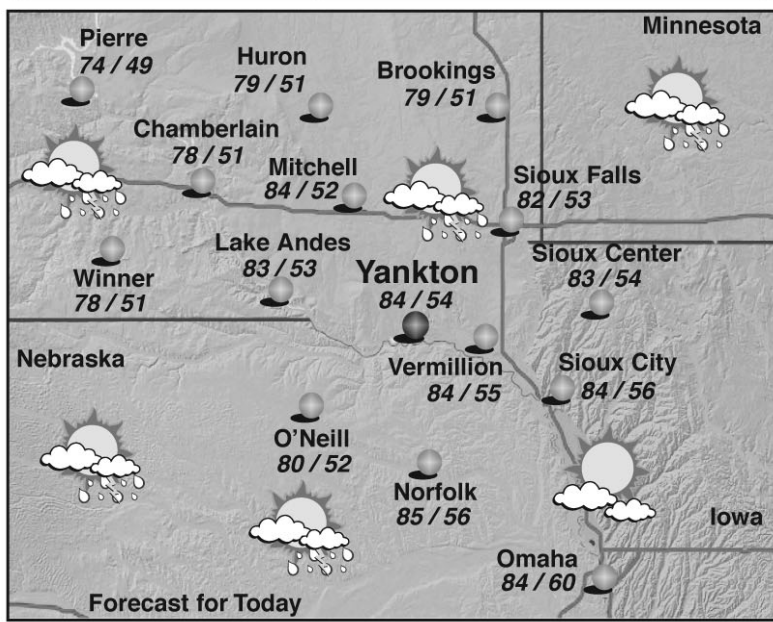

BOARD OF TRADE

CHICAGO (AP) — Grain futures were mixed Tuesday on the Chicago Board of Trade.
Wheat for July delivery fell 11.25 cents to \$6.0125 a bushel; July corn was 5.50 cents lower at 4.4550 a bushel; July oats were 4.50 cents higher at \$3.4750 a bushel; while July soybeans were 5.50 cents higher at \$14.6250 a bushel.

Beef was higher and pork was lower on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.
August live cattle rose .13 cent to \$1.4340 a pound; August feeder cattle was 1.65 cents higher at \$2.0517 a pound; while July lean hogs fell .801 cent to \$1.2515 a pound.

WALL ST. RECAP

The Standard & Poor's 500 index lost ground on Tuesday for just the second time this month. The slight loss for the index broke a four-day string of record highs.
The Dow Jones industrial average rose 2.82 points, or 0.02 percent, to 16,945.92.
The Standard & Poor's 500 index slipped 0.48 of a point, or 0.02 percent, to close at 1,950.79.

Casey Foundation, makes sure that legislators get the right data, policies and advocates they need to give children a better quality of life.
Another matter addressed at the briefing was childcare. An estimated 86 percent of Yankton children from ages 6-17 are from a home with all working parents. A major concern of KIDS COUNT is making sure that these children are supported after school, whether it's at a daycare or an after school program.
South Dakota is the only state in which a provider can have 13 children without being a licensed daycare.
"This is a manufacturing community. People aren't

thinking about if their provider has egress windows and a fire extinguisher. They are more worried about scheduling and getting to work," Cline said.
At the briefing, incentives where discussed to push unlicensed area daycares into getting a license. Some of these incentives included helping providers through development funds to help make their home a more suitable place to have a day care and other benefits including meal reimbursement.
KIDS COUNT plans to return to Yankton next fall for another briefing.

— though still a slight possibility in the mountains — is rapidly diminishing.
Dummer said at this point, most flooding has been concentrated on the lower third of the river basin, which is normal for this time of year.
"Several rain systems have moved through the southeastern half of the Missouri Basin during the last several days and that's resulted in widespread minor to moderate flooding, primarily focused in southern Iowa and the state of Missouri," he said. "The Missouri River itself has numerous locations in the minor flood category extended from Brownville, Nebraska, downstream. On-again, off-again minor flooding due to rainfall and thunderstorm activity will continue to be a threat in the lower third of the basin throughout the summer. This is typical and persists every year.
Farhat said while major flooding isn't anticipated, releases at the dams are still a bit higher than normal, but well below what was seen in 2011.
"Our latest forecast for runoff above Sioux City this year calls for 31.1 million acre feet — 123 percent of normal," she said. "To put this in perspective, runoff in 2011 was 61

million acre feet, nearly twice as much as this year."
Farhat said Gavins Point Dam releases averaged 29,700 (cubic feet per second) in May due to some temporary reductions.
"As part of our normal flood risk reduction measures, releases were temporarily reduced to 27,000 cfs last week in response to the heavy rain in the lower basin," she said.
South Dakota State climatologist Dennis Todey said at the moment, we are still anticipating an El Nino year.
"NOAA is projecting a 70 percent chance of an El Nino happening this summer. If not, more likely it's going to occur in the fall."
Heavy rainfall amounts over the last couple of weeks have also been beneficial to dry conditions throughout South Dakota and Nebraska, Todey said. Unofficially, Yankton has picked up 5.70 inches of precipitation since June 1 for a total of 9.88 inches on the year.
Average and below-average temperatures are also anticipated throughout the region this summer.

Haley Hinker of Mitchell was chosen as the Speaker of the House of Representatives while Sydney Gelling of Aberdeen was selected as the Nationalist Party Chair and Esther Swift of Burke as the Nationalist Party Keynote Speaker. ist Party elected Rachel Evangelisto of Box Elder as keynote speaker and the Federalist Party elected Courtney Anderson of Brookings as party chair. Calla Harper of Irene was recipient of the outstanding journalist award and Madysn Waage of Aberdeen received the highest exam score.
