Donner, a Crofton native and former collegiate standout, struck out 13 batters in an 8-0 home victory for the Bluejays who improved to 7-0 in the South Central League.

True to Donner's estimation, the shutout brought Crofton's runs allowed per game mark to seven runs in seven games — a full two runs better than the next best team in the league.

"It's still kind of hard to believe," Donner said Friday. "It actually felt like a no-

hitter for once," he added, referencing 5-inning and 7-inning no-hitters he threw back in his youth days.

Donner's performance marked the league's first nohitter since last July when Yankton's Trey Krier hurled a 7-inning no-hitter against Tabor. Krier had previously thrown a 9-inning no-hitter in the 2010 State Class A Tournament in Yankton.

According to state records, Donner's performance was the SCL's first Class B no-hitter since Freeman's Brett Waltner pitched a 7-inning masterpiece in 2002. The last 9-inning no-hitter in the SCL came in 1996 — when Donner was seven years old.

District 6B commissioner Larry Anderson, himself a former player, knows exactly how rare Donner's perform-

ing track Thursday, however, Donner would have had no way of knowing if he had a no-hitter going. The scoreboard in Crofton does not display hits or errors.

He admits, though, to thinking about a possible nohitter by the third or fourth inning.

By the time the top of the ninth rolled around, Donner said he wasn't sure if anyone else realized what was going on.

"To be honest, I was pretty nervous," he said. "I was wondering if my teammates even knew what was going on. I was thinking, Would they dive for a ball?"

All the mystery ended when Donner recorded the final out and his teammates mobbed him.

"I guess they knew," he joked.

Although Donner reached the feat, there have been other near no-hitters this season:

• On June 6, Freeman's Lee Scherschligt pitched a 1hitter, with 13 strikeouts, over Scotland. He allowed only a first-inning single to Scotland's Joe Kronaizl.

• Crofton boasts a pair of two-hitters, with Seth Erdmann and Rand Thygeson combining on those performances

Going back in the archives, Freeman's Justin Pfeiffer pitched a 9-inning nohitter back in 1996. Shortly after that performance, however, he was in a car accident that all but ended his pitching career, according to Anderson — who was Freeman's twitter.com/jhoeck. Discuss manager at the time.

A lot has changed in Class B baseball since that time, including the use of wood bats starting in 2012. No-hitters may, in time, become more common because of that change, Anderson said. Class A began using wood bats in 2004.

"I grew up in the wooden bat era, and to me, it's baseball," Anderson said. "The scores are a lot lower, games are faster, and what used to be home run is a long fly ball.

Crofton has found success - particularly at the state tournament — in recent seasons because of the wood bats, which has in turn boosted the pitching staff, according to Donner.

"We've got some really good pitchers, and none of us throws the same way," he said. "That's why it makes us

the way we are. "Nobody can get used to a certain way.

Talking about Donner's performance, Anderson commended him for making SCL

history. "I know Scot, and it couldn't happen to a nicer guy,' Anderson said. "Throughout all the years, with as much involvement as Crofton has had in the state tournament, I've

gotten to know those guys pretty well.' Crofton visits Wynot on Sunday night in a makeup game, and the Bluejays then host Lesterville next Thurs-

last month won The Players Championship.

"I never played on tour when Tiger was doing this leading by six, seven, eight shots," said 20-year-old Jordan Spieth, who had a 70 and was nine shots back. "But I imagine this is what it was like the way Martin is playing this week.

Brandt Snedeker had a 68 and joined Na at 3-under 137. Only nine others were under par going into the weekend. It looks like a typical U.S.

Open — except for Kaymer. Dustin Johnson opened

with a pair of 69s, a score he would have gladly taken at the start of the week and perhaps thought it would be good enough to lead.

"I wouldn't have thought it would be eight shots behind," Johnson said.

Brooks Koepka, the American who is carving his way through the European Tour, birdied his last hole for a 68 and joined the group at 2under 138 with Brendon de Jonge (70), Henrik Stenson (69) and former PGA champion Keegan Bradley, who played in the same group with Kaymer and rallied for a 69. "He's as dialed in as I've

seen," Bradley said.

Starting on the back nine, Kaymer hit wedge into 5 feet for birdie on the par-5 10th. He made birdie putts from 20 and 25 feet, and then hit a gorgeous drive on the par-4 third hole, where the tee was moved up to make it play 315 yards. His shot landed perfectly between two bunkers and bounced onto the green to set up a two-putt birdie.

And the lead kept growing. "I look at the scoreboards. It's enjoyable," Kaymer said.

'To see what's going on, to watch yourself, how you react if you're leading by five, by six. . I don't know, but it's quite nice to play golf that way."

Kaymer was the sixth player in U.S. Open history to reach double-digits under par, though McIlroy was the only other player to get there before the weekend.

This is the "Germanator" everyone expected when he won the PGA Championship, and then a year later rose to No. 1 in the world. Kaymer felt his game was not complete enough, so he set out to develop a draw — his natural shot is a fade — and it took two years of lonely hours on the range to get it right. At the moment, he can do

no wrong.
