He transferred to Kansas and after sitting out 2012, had a disappointing 2013 with the Jayhawks. He completed 49 percent of his passes last season with eight touchdowns and 10 interceptions.

Kaymer finished at 9-under 271.

His last two wins are the U.S. Open and The Players Championship, with the strongest and deepest field in golf. He never trailed after any round in both of them.

"Martin was playing his own tournament," Fowler said after recovering from a double bogey on the fourth hole to close with a 72.

This U.S. Open really ended Friday.

No one had ever opened 65-65 in the U.S. Open, which broke the 36-hole record that Mcllroy set three years ago rain-softened Congressional. When it could have gotten away from Kaymer in the third round, he stayed strong for a stabilizing 72

He kind of killed the event in the first two days," Henrik Stenson said. "He went out and shot two 65s and left everyone in the dust.
