arena, but an outdoor track and soccer complex. Eventually that project came to include an academic "connector" building between the DakotaDome and the new arena

And now, all these years later, USD will break ground today (Tuesday) at 1:45 p.m. in Vermillion on those three projects — highlighted, of course, by the 6,000 seat basketball/volleyball arena. The 'real' construction work will not begin until next month, but today's ceremony isn't about lay-

ing concrete. It's about seeing actual progress on a vision that began all those years ago. Because that's all it takes at this point: Progress. Actual, tangible progress that fans, donors, coaches and players can see. Proof that within two years, nearly every athletic program in Coyote nation will be in a new home — football, for one, will stay in the DakotaDome.

Delays or not, the actual opening for the arena, outdoor track, soccer complex and academic connector wasn't going to change. The year 2016 was always the goal.

Looking back on those casual conversations from 10 years ago, 2016 would have seemed like such a distant, unrealistic venture.

In reality, though, everyone can wait two more years, right?

GPAC, KCAC Announce Football Challenge For 2015 And 2016

IOUX CITY, Iowa — The Kansas Collegiate Athletic Conference (KCAC) and the Great Plains Athletic Conference (GPAC) football coaches and commissioners have come to an agreement on a series of football games played between teams from each league starting with the 2015 season.

The two-vear agreement between the conferences would pair teams based on their conference finishes in 2013 & 2014 for 2015 & 2016 challenges. KCAC teams will host the first set of non-conference games on September 5, 2015 with the GPAC representatives playing host the following season.

One of the primary intents of the scheduling arrangement is to ease overall scheduling for teams from both conferences. Based on the agreement, teams will have one additional nonconference game to schedule outside of the KCAC/GPAC Challenge. Following the series game each year, both leagues will move into their respective conference schedules and play nine consecutive weeks of league games

Taylor has managed tremendous growth in the athletics department since the school announced its plan to move to Division I athletics a dozen years ago. The athletic department had a budget of \$5.6 million at the start of the transition Now it's more than \$17 million.
