and relatives of those killed. The Baqouba killings, in which Shiite militiamen shot dead nearly four dozen Sunni detainees in a city jail, have been widely reported. Amnesty said its report shows "a worrying pattern of reprisal attacks against Sunnis" in retaliation for the insurgent

gains. On the military front, a senior Iraqi army official told the AP that four helicopters carrying Iraqi commandos landed at a soccer pitch inside a university campus in militant-held Tikrit late Thursday and clashed with Islamic State fighters for several hours.

One of the helicopters developed mechanical problems after takeoff from Tikrit, 80 miles (130 kilometers) north of Baghdad, but landed safely in the provincial military headquarters. The official had no word on casualties and declined to specify the mission's objectives. He spoke on condition of anonymity because he was not authorized to brief the media.

The official also said 200 troops have arrived at a key oil refinery north of Baghdad under attack by militants for more than a week. The reinforcements join a 100-strong contingent that has been defending the Beiji refinery, Iraq's largest and the source of about a quarter of the country's oil needs, including fuel for power stations.

The news from Tikrit and Beiji suggested that Iraq's military was stepping up efforts to regain its footing against the insurgents, who appear to be trying to carve out a selfstyled Islamic state straddling the Iraqi-Syrian border.

On Friday, al-Maliki warned army commanders in televised comments that militants were likely to try to undermine security in the Iraqi capital ahead of Tuesday's parliamentary session.

He also sounded upbeat about the military situation, saying the armed forces have regained the initiative and are now on the offensive, citing Thursday's Tikrit raid as an example.

Two Iraqi security officials, meanwhile, said several second-hand Sukhoi fighter jets the government purchased from Russia will arrive in two days at an air base in southern Iraq. Iraq's air force, which has been decimated over the past two decades, had Sukhoi jets in its fleet before the 2003 U.S.led invasion.

Barack Obama to assist and advise Iraqi troops. The U.S. also has started flying armed Predator drones over Baghdad to protect U.S. interests in the Iraqi capital, a Pentagon official said Friday. He spoke on condition of anonymity because he was not authorized to discuss the new flights on the record.

Meanwhile, Human Rights Watch released a report about the killings of scores of police and soldiers by the Sunni militants in the days after it captured Iraq's second-largest city, Mosul, then stormed south to capture Saddam Hussein's hometown of Tikrit.

The killings were widely reported after the Islamic State posted graphic online photos showing dozens of men dressed in civilian clothes lined up or lying face down as militants pointed rifles at their backs. A final set of photos

showed their bloodied bodies. Human Rights Watch said that analysis of the photos and satellite imagery indicated that the militants killed 160 to 190 men in two locations in Tikrit between June 11 and June 14, and the number of victims might be even higher.

Human Rights Watch said it used satellite imagery and publicly available photos to pinpoint the site of the killings in a field next to the Tigris River and near one of Saddam's former palaces.

Chief Iraqi military spokesman Ĺt. Gen. 仪assim al-Moussawi confirmed the photos' authenticity on June 15, after they surfaced, and told The Associated Press that an examination by military ex-perts showed that about 170 soldiers were shot to death after their capture.

The massacre appeared to be aimed at instilling fear in Iraq's demoralized armed forces, as well as the country's Shiite majority.

There are signs that both sides have committed atrocities, rights groups say. Amnesty International said Friday that it has evidence that suggests "a pattern of extrajudicial executions" of mainly Sunni detainees by government forces and Shiite militias in Tal Afar, Mosul and Bagouba. It based its conclusions on interviews with survivors

The Cedar County Commission is seeking disaster funding, according to Commissioners Dave McGregor of Hartington and Terry Pinkelman of Wynot . They told the Press & Dakotan they expect to receive updated figures on the county's infrastructure losses.

The disaster declaration notes the storms as "causing severe damage to public and private property, disruption of utility service, and endangerment of health and safety of the citizens of Cedar County within the disaster area."

The declaration authorizes the expenditure of emergency funds from all available sources, the invoking of mutual aid agreements, and applying for state assistance from the governor's emergency fund and any other resources the governor deems necessary.

Garvin has spent much of the past week with county, state and federal officials traveling around Cedar County to survey damage. Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) officials toured Cedar County on Wednesday.

'FEMA worked with individual assistance damage assessments (Wednesday)," the emergency manager said. "They're coming back next Wednesday to do (a survey of) public assistance."

The public sector assistance covers governmentowned infrastructure such as roads and bridges. As part of the process, Cedar County officials will tabulate the storm-related damage.

According to FEMA, the individual assistance helps private individuals and families whose property has been damaged or destroyed as a result of a federally-declared disaster, and whose losses are not covered by

insurance. It is meant to help with critical expenses that cannot be covered in other ways. This assistance is not intended to restore damaged property to its conditions before the disaster.

Besides the property losses, the recent storms will impact the county's valuations and tax collections, according to Cedar County Assessor Don Hoesing.

"By year's end, we need to get in touch with landowners to see which property has been lost so we can determine which property remains taxable and which is untaxable as of Jan. 1, 2015,' he said.

Under state statute, the assessments set for 2014 remain in place and cannot be adjusted because of the recent damage and pro-rated for the remainder of the year, Hoesing said.

With damage assessment still under way, the clean-up from last week's storms also remains a work in progress, Garvin said.

Volunteers are asked to report at 8:30 a.m. today (Saturday) at the Coleridge Community Building. No follow-up work session had been set for Laurel.

The storms' impact can't be totally measured in dollars and cents, Garvin said. The losses have also proven stressful for county residents as they seek to rebuild their lives.

"The Red Cross is offering counseling services if needed," he said. "They are doing case work and serving those who have been affected (by the storms).

machinery and equipment were damaged and another 50 were destroyed for total losses of \$11.4 million. Also, 123 farm structures were damaged and 40 were destroyed for total losses of \$8.35 million.

Additionally, the Cedar County assessment report covers crop losses: • The report lists 7,520

destroyed acres and 10,340 damaged acres of corn out of 183,160 planted acres. Using an average price of \$4.90 per bushel, the loss of 1,823,600 bushels amounts to a loss of \$8,935,640.

• The report for soybeans lists 4,480 destroyed acres and 6,160 damaged acres out of 112,740 planted acres.

Using an average price of \$11.50, the loss of 316,400 bushels amounts to a loss of \$3,638,600.

• For livestock, the assessment lists a loss of 75 adult beef cattle, 40 adult dairy cattle, two beef bulls

and 10 swine. The Cedar County commissioners have passed a disaster declaration, setting in motion an effort to obtain relief for this month's flooding and tornadoes. The commissioners passed the declaration upon Garvin's recommendation as emer-

gency manager. The commissioners signed their declaration June 19, citing a number of severe weather events. Those events include excessive rainfall resulting in flooding along with tornado strikes June 1, 14, 16 and 17.

The June 17 tornadoes struck the Coleridge and Lau-

rel areas particularly hard.
