Between them, Darrel and Jeanne Mogck have together more than 70 years of experience driving a bus for the Yankton School District. The husband and wife from Yankton have driven generations of area youth to and from school. They've gotten to know a wide variety of students, from kindergarten all the way up through high school.

What they'll be faced with next week, however, is unlike anything the couple has ever experienced.

The Mogcks will be two of 16 bus drivers for in-town routes for the upcoming World Archery Youth Championships (WAYC), set for June 8-14.

The 16 independently-hired bus drivers from the Yankton School District will split up four routes to transport the archers to and from their hotels, and to and from their various other activities during the week-long tournament.

The demolition of two structures on the Human Services Center has helped pave the way for the city to purchase more land in addition to the 33 acres it had previously purchased from the state.

Community Development Director Dave Mingo told the Press & Dakotan that the buildings had prevented the acquisition of the 11.27 acres earlier.

DOT: Sturgis Rally May Draw 1.2 Million

PIERRE — State Department of Transportation officials are planning for 800,000 to 1.2 million people at the seventyfifth Sturgis motorcycle rally this August.

That estimate is approximately twice as many people as the rally has seen in the past 25 years.

The modern high was 605,140 in 2003. Recent years have hovered either side of the 400,000 mark.

South Dakota DOT engineers and planners have been meeting for months with local officials to discuss how to keep traffic flowing.

Stacy Bartlett, an access management engineer for DOT's western region, provided the state Transportation Commission with a briefing Thursday about the preparations.

She said motorcycle companies Harley-Davidson and Indian are preparing their services to handle approximately 1 million people.

Bartlett acknowledged the attendance estimates based on traffic entering Sturgis aren't precise. "People can get
