

No Injuries In **Vermillion Fire**

VERMILLION — The Vermillion Rural Fire Department and Vermillion Fire EMS Department responded to a reported structure fire with an occupant on the second floor at 8 a.m. Saturday.

The renter, who was the only occupant, was asleep when her dog woke her alerting her that something was wrong. When she opened her bedroom door, the room quickly filled with smoke from a fast moving fire in the living room. Following direction from a 911 dispatcher, she was able to jump from the window, saving herself and her dog.

Crews arrived on scene confirming a working fire reporting heavy fire and smoke with flames coming from two windows and the roof. Two

engine company crews made entry to extinguish the fire and encountered extremely high temperatures due to the interior finish of the home being mostly non-rated wood paneling. After a quick attack by fire crews, the fire was extinguished, limiting the fire damage to only 50 percent of the second floor.

The occupant was evaluated by EMS and did not report any injuries.

Vermillion fire investigators found there were no working smoke detectors on site. An electrical short inside the wall started the fire.

Responding units included the Vermillion Rural Fire Department, Vermillion Fire EMS, Clay County Sheriff and the South Dakota Highway Patrol.




