Time and again, you've heard me talk about -- or read about -- how fortunate Yankton is to have the World Archery Youth Championships (WAYC) coming to our city next week. And while making that point, for as valid as it is, can run its course, I'm trying to find new ways to put into perspective exactly how lucky we are. A year ago when it was announced that Yankton won the 2015 WAYC bid, there was a dual sense of 'Seriously? Not only did our town land such a prestigious event, but we beat out Mexico City for the bid. Yes, Mexico City, with its population of nearly nine million people. With that number in mind, I spent a few minutes Tuesday research-

ing the history of the WAYC, which held its first tournament in 1991. As the biennial (every two years) tournament has evolved, its host locations have progressively gotten larger. Twice before has the event come to the United States, to Chula Vista, California, in 1996 and Ogden, Utah, in 2009. Consider the recent and upcoming locations: \* The 2006 WAYC was held in Merida, Mexico. Population: 970,000. \* 2008 was held in Antalya, Turkey. Population: 1.1 million. \* 2009 (breaking the biennial format) was held in Ogden, Utah, which has a metro population (near Salt Lake City) of 547,000. \* 2011 was held in Legnica, Poland. Population: 102,000. \* 2013 was held in Wuji, China. Population: 6.3 million. \* The 2015 bid was given to Yankton, South Dakota. Population: 14,591.

\* The 2017 WAYC will be held in Buenos Aires, Argentina. Population: 2.9 million.

Those numbers alone should tell the story, but I'll repeat my common line: Yankton, believe it or not, is on the international map for something. Every city wants to boast that it's unique in something; that it is special.

For Yankton, that's archery. There's absolutely no question about it; that's not up for debate. It's not the river. It's not the lakes. It's archery. And we've vaulted ourselves onto international radars in that sport just within the last 8-9 years.

The facilities we boast in Yankton and our city's experience hosting international archery tournaments was a key reason World Archery awarded this town the 2015 WAYC bid. It's something we should all embrace.

Miles CC Teammates Sign With Mount Marty Baseball

Two teammates from Miles Community College, both with ties to the Mount Marty College baseball program, will follow older brothers and compete for the Lancers, the institution announced on Tuesday. Brandon Kemp of Spearfish and Sean O'Connell of Kalspell, Montana, will attend Mount Marty College and play baseball for the Lancers. Each will have two years of eligibility remaining for the Lancers.

"Over the years we have had a strong relationship with Miles Community College. Coaches Jeff Brabant and Dan McKinney do an incredible job of teaching the game and preparing their players for the four year level," said MMC head baseball coach Andy Bernatow. "This past season Mount Marty Baseball graduated 17 seniors from the program and having older and experienced junior college baseball players coming into the program is a big benefit for us."

Kemp, the younger brother of former Lancers Matt (MMC '08) and Justin (MMC '12) Kemp, was a two-year starter in the infield for Miles CC. He batted .294 with a .922 fielding percentage this past season. "Both of Brandon's brothers showed great

playing ability and leadership skills during their time at Mount Marty and I know he demonstrates the same," Bernatow said. "He comes to us with starting and championship experience from an outstanding program at Miles Community College."

O'Connell, the younger brother of Mike O'Connell (MMC '14), batted .333 with 18 runs scored this past season.

"With Sean, his brother had an outstanding career at Mount Marty after he transferred from Miles and Sean seems to have the capabilities to do the same," Bernatow said.

Kemp, the son of Tony and Denise Kemp, plans to major in recreation management at MMC. He will receive a Mount Marty College Academic Honors Scholarship for his academic achievement in addition to his baseball scholarship.

O'Connell, the son of Kelly and Jeanne O'Connell, also plans to major in recreation management at MMC. He will receive a Mount Marty College Academic Excellence Scholarship in addition to his baseball scholarship.

Jorgensen Named South Dakota Diving Coach

VERMILLION — South Dakota head swimming and diving coach Jason Mahowald has named Kris Jorgensen to his coaching staff. Jorgensen will work with the divers. "We are excited to have Kris joining our staff," said Mahowald. "His experience competing at the highest level in the NCAA and internationally will help our divers make that jump to the next level. Kris is also very connected throughout the Midwest and will make an immediate impact in our recruiting."

Jorgensen spent the past three years as the head diving coach at St. Catherine University. He coached several all-Minnesota Intercollegiate Athletic Conference honorees, including two-time all-MIAC Diver of the Year Jenna Nyga.

Beyond the collegiate realm, Jorgensen also coached at the Minnesota Diving Academy for three years and founded the Highland Diving Club in 2014. Jorgensen received a bachelor's degree in psychology from the University of Minnesota in 2013. He completed his master's degree in applied sport and exercise science from Minnesota in May.

As a diver at Minnesota, Jorgensen was the 2012 Big Ten Co-Diver of the Championship after winning the 10-meter dive. He finished runner-up in the 10-meter dive in 2011. A native of Norway, Jorgensen won 12 national

championships and competed for the Norwegian national team from 2004-12. He competed at the 2009 and 2011 World University Games. Jorgensen placed eighth in the 10-meter synchronized event at the 2008 European Championships.

Wade Transfers To SDSU

BROOKINGS — South Dakota State women's basketball has signed Tonia Wade, a 6-foot forward from St. John's University, head coach Aaron Johnston announced Tuesday. Wade will sit out the 2015-16 campaign in accordance with the NCAA transfer rules before stepping on the court as a sophomore in 2016-17.

A native of Bloomington, Minn., Wade played in 27 games for the Storm, averaging 1.4 points and 1.7 rebounds per game. The versatile player had career highs of seven points at Georgetown Jan. 23 and six rebounds at Marquette Feb. 13.

Wade had an illustrious high school career at Bloomington Kennedy, twice being named to the Class 4A all-state team. As a senior she led her team to a 25-7 record and the Minnesota Class 4A state championship game for the second-straight year. For her career, Wade scored over 1,000 points and grabbed over 500 rebounds.

A four-star recruit, Wade finished her high school career ranked 21st at her position by ESPN HoopGuriz and ranked No. 99th nationally by ProspectsNation.com.
