Historic Home Open For Touring

The 2015 touring season at the Cramer-Kenyon Historic Home, located at 509 Pine Street in Yankton, is officially opened.

Built in the late 1870's and first occupied in the 1880's, this Eastlake Stick Style home occupies a place on the Historic Register and has been a source of inspiration for visitors since the mid-1970s.

The home is named in honor of Nelson J. and Alice Bullfinch Cramer who lived there from 1890 until their deaths in 1916 and 1929. The house then went to Mr. Cramer's great-niece, Esther Kenyon who lived there with her husband, Herbert, and family until his death in 1972. Most of the furnishings in the home belonged to either the Cramer's or the Kenyon's and have been carefully safeguarded over the years so that they maintain their original magnificent Victorian elegance.

During the season, tours are given of the entire historic home including the basement with its winter fish pond, the attic which was the living quarters for the house help during the time the Cramer and Kenyon families lived there, and the two richly appointed levels which comprise the rooms which the family inhabited from 1890 forward. The carriage house is also on the tour list, as is the gazebo and, of course, the gardens which feature flowers and bushes reminiscent of the era in which the home was occupied by the Cramer and Kenyon families.

Some improvements to enhance the comfort of visitors have been added. The front steps have been rebuilt as has the entrance door leading into the east-facing covered porch. There is, of course, a lift at the west side of the house for our visitors who have difficulty with steps. At your first visit you will meet our Tour Guide/Caretaker, Veronica, who will enthrall you with the family's stories.

Regular tours are held Wednesday through Sunday until Labor Day from 1-4 p.m.; a small fee is asked, with children under 5 admitted free. For large group tours, call the caretaker of the Home at (605) 665-7470. Arrangements can also be made for small receptions and parties by calling that number.

Professor Named To National Post

VERMILLION — The National Science Foundation has appointed USD Professor Paula Mabee, Ph.D., to its leadership team as director of the Division of Environmental Biology, which supports fundamental research on populations, species, communities and ecosystems.

"I am very strong believer in the National Science Foundation's mission, which is to promote fundamental science," Mabee said. "As someone whose research has been funded by NSF and who has served previously on a number of panels, I am interested in helping shape the vision in the Division of Environmental Biology."

Mabee will join NSF in August for an assignment that will last from 1-4 years. The position falls under the Intergovernmental Personnel Act, which allows individuals from colleges, universities, and other organizations to hold temporary positions in the federal government. She will continue her research program at USD while serving in the NSF position.

"These temporary 'rotator' positions bring in fresh vision from scientists who are active in their fields," said Mabee, whose research focuses on connecting data on organism phenotypes (like anatomy) to genes in order to enhance knowledge of development and evolution. "My research is pretty broad and has touched on core pieces in the division-evolutionary biology, developmental biology and databases. I bring in a cross disciplinary perspective."

Mabee's position will include directing the activities of the Division of Environmental Biology and developing breakthrough opportunities for scientific advancements in the field. She will supervise program officers who review about 3,000 grant proposals per year.

"Our nation depends on the science that's done at the National Science Foundation," Mabee said. "And my division will deal with some of the critical issues facing society, such as climate change."

Mabee will reside in Arlington, Virginia, the site of the headquarters of the NSF, while she completes her temporary assignment. She said she sees her new position as a way to give back to her professional field.

"This position is federal service and also serves science," Mabee said of her assignment. "I'm especially excited about developing new opportunities for scientists in the Division of Environmental Biology."
