better access to different types of birth control, such as IUDs and hormonal injections and implants.

"I think better education about the different birth control methods that are out there for women increased access," Remington said. "Sometimes through family planning programs, Title X program and, in some states, Medicaid expansion that expanded family planning services to women of lower incomes — all of that made (birth control) more accessible and more affordable for women."

Schmit-Albin said her group intends to keep pressure on the Nebraska Legislature to pass more measures, including bills that failed to move out of committee this session. One would require abortion clinics to post signs reiterating the importance of informed consent. Another would reclassify facilities that perform five or more abortions a month as ambulatory surgical centers, requiring them to meet more stringent state and federal standards and have a written agreement with a hospital in which patients could be transferred in case of an emergency beyond the capabilities of clinic staff.

There are three abortion centers in the state that perform five or more procedures a month: Planned Parenthood clinics in Omaha and Lincoln and the Bellevue Health Center.

Schmit-Albin believes the retirement this year of a doctor who had performed abortions at the Lincoln clinic will precipitate a further decline in abortions in Nebraska. But Remington said Planned Parenthood has a doctor filling in on a temporary basis, and hopes to have a permanent replacement in the near future.

Wet Conditions Change Fishing In Black Hills

RAPID CITY (AP) — Rain, rain, go away. That's what all the fishermen say. Well, 2015 rains have not been listening.

The unseasonably wet start to the summer has flooded boat ramps, intensified creek waters and forced anglers elsewhere.

Some pro shops advise anglers to wait it out. Others say don't let this soggy weather dampen your fishing desire. Even with less than ideal weather, a change in location and strategy can help you catch more fish in the worst of conditions.

"When the water's high, go to the ponds and lakes," Dakota Angler & Outfitters fishing guide and instructor David Gamet told the *Rapid City Journal*.

Anglers are still finding success in smaller bays, side streams and lakes with less runoff and slower, cleaner waters throughout the Black Hills.

Andy Pitsor, a fishing outfitter at Cabela's, listed Sheridan Lake, Angostura Reservoir and Jenny Gulch in Pactola Lake as top options right now.

No matter where an angler ends up, safety should be their first priority — stay away from flooded creeks and do not wade into swift water; no fish is worth risking your life. People using boats should make sure docking areas are usable before heading out.

Trying to catch fish on high, fast and murky waters comes with a specific set of challenges.

Artists To Brighten North Platte Sidewalks

NORTH PLATTE, Neb. (AP) — Several artists are planning to brush up the downtown area of North Platte.

The murals appearing on city sidewalks near storm sewers are a part of a project from Keep North Platte and Lincoln County Beautiful.

Holly Carlini, KNPLCB programs director, said the paintings are to help raise awareness for how pollutants can impact the ecosystem through street drains. A lot of people, she said, don't know the storm sewers all

lead to the Platte rivers.

"This is a fun way to show people where these lead," she told *The North Platte Telegraph*.

For the project, Carlini contacted about 10 artists in the area. They've been given two squares of concrete near the storm drain to paint with water-related themes. Pat Milne, for example, is painting a pool of water polluted with brightly colored sludge.

Milne said this is the first time he's done a street project. Typically, he uses spray paints on boards and paper to create his art, but spray paints don't work quite as well in the windy corridor in

front of Red Roof Antiques, where his street mural is being completed.

He wants to make the pool look realistic, like a person on the sidewalk could really step into the water if not careful.

Down the street, Jackie Proctor, an art teacher at Madison Middle School, and Olivia Davis, an Adams Middle School student mentored by Proctor through Community Connections, are painting a dragonfly pond draining into the storm sewer nearby.

Proctor said they're using a high-traffic paint that won't wash off in weather or from

foot traffic.

Carlini said it's all environmentally friendly. She said she spoke with other communities that have done similar projects, particularly one in Arkansas that helped her pick out paint to use and how to go about the project.

Carlini said she hopes all the artwork is finished before the Honky Tonk Barbecue on June 13, which will be downtown. The artwork will also be a part of the Railfest Water Run in September.

Hopefully, Carlini said, the art will draw attention to what items find their way to the sewers, like cigarette butts, paints and oils.
