Library Offers Busy Slate This Week

The Yankton Community Library has a calendar full of fun activities and events for all ages for the second week of the summer reading program. The week's theme is "History's Heroes."

On Monday, June 8, at 3 p.m., there will be crafts for elementary students. Kids will be making superhero masks and power cuffs. Preschool story time is at 6:30 p.m. that evening. The staff will read "Ladybug Girl and the Bug Squad" and "My Mom has X-Ray Vision," sing some songs, and do a bug craft.

Tuesday, June 9, provides activities for everyone. Toddler Time with stories, songs, and movement is at 10:15 a.m. and 5:30 p.m. It's for 1-3 year olds with a parent or caregiver with siblings welcome. Superhero Training Camp for elementary school-aged children takes place at 11 a.m. This is an active, action-packed test of superhero skills. It will be outside if the weather is nice. The teens are meeting at 2 p.m. to test their knowledge of Superhero Trivia.

Preschool story time is repeated Wednesday morning at 10:15 a.m. At 1 p.m., Jonathan May MAGIC will amaze us with his skill and tricks. This show is free and open to all ages.

On Thursday, June 11, there will be another session of preschool story time at 10:15 a.m. At 1 p.m. the meeting room will be full of LEGOs: The regular LEGO Club will meet in half of the meeting room, and Stephanie Siebrandt from the Yankton County 4-H office is leading LEGO Robotics in the other half. The robotics sessions are limited to the first 24 participants who register. Children must be 8 or older to sign up for LEGO robotics. On that same day, Jonathan May MAGIC returns at 3:30 p.m. for a magic workshop, so you can learn some of the secrets of magic tricks.

Friday, June 12, the summer Reading Club begins at 11 a.m. This is an informal get-together for readers of all ages. The library staff will have theme-related books to share or you can bring your own. Participants will buddy read, group read, talk about books, and share what they're reading. It's a great way to log 30 minutes on your reading calendar. The staff will end the week with games for all ages in the meeting room from 2-4 p.m. The Wii will be available, as well as board games.

It is not too late to register for the summer reading program. "Every Hero Has a Story" is for preschoolers and elementary students. Unmask is the teen program for students in grades 6-12. Stop by the library, register, pick up your program materials and join the fun.

USD Ed. School Names New Dean

VERMILLION — Donald R. Easton-Brooks of Eastern Oregon University has been named dean of the School of Education at the University of South Dakota, starting June 22.

Easton-Brooks spent two years at Eastern Oregon in La Grande as a professor and dean of the Colleges of Business and Education. He is a 1988 graduate of Greenville College in Greenville, Illinois, with a bachelor's degree in sociology. He received his master's degree in early childhood special education at the University of Colorado at Denver in 1995 and earned his doctorate in education leadership and innovation from UC-Denver in 2006. Easton-Brooks' research and scholarship includes urban education, ethnic-matching of students and teachers, minority education and teacher diversity.

"We are thrilled to have this outstanding leader join the USD community," said USD Provost Jim Moran. "Dr. Easton-Brooks comes to USD with a wealth of experiences especially with respect to connecting the academia with the local communities, in program delivery and curriculum models, in fundraising and in student recruitment and retention."

Since 1996 Easton-Brooks worked as an instructor and a lecturer in the fields of human development, health and human services and sociology at several colleges and universities. He served as assistant professor of education at the University of North Texas and as associate professor at Hamline University before becoming a full professor at Eastern Oregon in 2013. He has been a member of the American Educational Research Association, the National Association for Multicultural Education and the National Black Child Development Institute.

"I see this opportunity as one that allows us to work effectively with our partners, engage in meaningful and impactful research to provide our students with a quality academic experience and a chance to build strong relationships with alumni," Easton-Brooks said. "I see us making strong impacts on the various fields in the school, and I am looking forward to assisting the school and the university in building a stronger national and international presence."

Law School Unveils Historical Website

VERMILLION — The University of South Dakota School of Law and the South Dakota Supreme Court have created a website that provides written histories and video-recorded oral accounts of the state's highest court.

The site, <http://nativeede.wix.com/judicialvoices>, entitled "Judicial Voices Project: Capturing Histories of the South Dakota Supreme Court on its 125th Anniversary," includes the most comprehensive research on the court ever done as well as a collections of video interviews with current justices, some retirees and others familiar with the Supreme Court.

The effort was the product of conversations between Chief Justice David Gilbertson, the court's historian, and John Glover, recent Bush Foundation Fellow and long-standing professor at Black Hills State University, who was at the time associate dean of the University of South Dakota School of Law.

"Similar approaches have taken place with other courts, although such recorded oral histories are far less frequently occurring than one might expect," Glover said. "As the Chief Justice pointed out, the most notable example of such interviews involved the U.S. Supreme Court in a project through C-SPAN. Additional examples can be found involving the courts in a half a dozen states including California, Kentucky, New York, New Hampshire, Texas and regional neighbor Minnesota."

Judicial Voices was initiated by a seed grant awarded by the South Dakota Humanities Council in the spring of 2014. Additional support and funding came

from the USD School of Law and Dean Tom Geu, the Unified Judicial System, the South Dakota Bar Association and the Woods, Fuller, Schultz & Smith law firm in Sioux Falls. South Dakota Public Broadcasting provided technical assistance. The project team was managed by Native Educational Endeavors Inc., directed by Glover and included Chief Justice Gilbertson, Dean Geu, Richard Gregerson, Web specialists Beth Aaker and Annie Woodle, editors Prairey Walking and recent USD law graduate and attorney Kelsea Kenzy Sutton, and videographer Shane Art.
