Egg Impact

Producers, Consumers Feeling Effects Of Avian Flu Outbreak

The avian flu epidemic has had a massive impact on the Yankton area and Midwest as a whole during the last few months. As poultry populations continue to be wiped out — thousands or millions per farm — in order to contain the virus, the consumer market is now beginning to see the effects with some entities beginning to take proactive measures to help keep costs down.

Avera Sacred Heart Hospital (ASHH), for instance, has started looking at the egg products

on its cafeteria menu.

Doralynne Jarvis, director of the ASHH nutrition services department, told the *Press & Dakotan*, that their current food supplier has been keeping an eye on the situation and taking its own precautions.

"Through our food supplier, our eggs have been under allocation going into the third week," Jarvis said. "What that means is, they're closely watching their purchasers for what they're purchasing for eggs and egg products and the quantity. If you have not purchased a certain egg

Thune: Delmont Decision Wasn't A Surprise

DELMONT — U.S. Sen. John Thune said Wednesday he isn't surprised federal officials rejected individual assistance for tornado victims in Charles Mix and Douglas counties.

"I'm disappointed, but we weren't able to reach the (monetary) threshold necessary to trigger individual assistance, and we weren't able to reach the threshold to trigger public assistance, either," Thune (R-S.D.) told the *Press & Dakotan*.

Gov. Dennis Daugaard had sought a presidential disaster declaration for those impacted by the May 10 tornado. The Mother's Day storm, rated an EF-2 twister, carved a swath 17 miles long and 400 miles wide with peak winds of 130 miles per hour.

The storm hit the west end of Delmont particularly hard, destroying homes, the century-old Zion Lutheran Church and the new fire hall yet to be dedicated. The tornado caused extensive damage to more than 80 structures, including area farms.

At Daugaard's request, the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) and the Small Business Administration (SBA) conducted a preliminary damage assessment in Delmont and the surrounding area. The assessment covered private homes and

Archery Swap Meet Is Part Of The Trade

Archers competing in the 2015 World Archery Youth Championships (WAYC) were given the opportunity to return home with a small piece of the world after competition concludes Sunday.

On Wednesday evening, a swap event at the Easton Archery Yankton Complex allowed the contestants from 51 countries to exchange small items of significance from their country with fellow archers.

"We've modeled it after Science Olympiad," said Stephanie Moser, director of the Convention and Visitors Bureau in Yankton. "It was something our Science Olympiad team does when they go to competitions. They have each team bring items to swap with other teams."

Archers were encouraged to bring a handful of small items to be exchanged so they could swap multiple times during the allotted, one-hour time frame.

"What is really fun is that even when you swap, if you notice something you'd really like, you can swap your item multiple times," Moser said.

Common items included T-shirts, magnets, pins, hats, bracelets and key chains.

"It's the meeting of the different cultures that had me excited to participate," said Great Britain archer Struan Caughey. "I liked
