List Of Potential New UND

Nicknames Narrowed To 15

GRAND FORKS, N.D. (AP) — A committee has narrowed to 15 the list of possible nicknames for the University of North Dakota, including simply "North Dakota."

The group started out with nearly 1,200 potential monikers. It was whittled to about five dozen and then to 15. That list will be narrowed even further before a final list is brought to the public for a vote.

State residents voted overwhelmingly in 2012 to dump UND's "Fighting Sioux" nickname and accompanying American Indian head logo that had been in place since the 1930s. The NCAA threatened sanctions against the school saying the nickname and logo were hostile and abusive, and that UND was not endorsed by one of the state's two namesake tribes. The state Legislature put a moratorium on replacing the nickname until this year.

The 15 names still in the running are North Dakota, Blaze, Cavalry, Explorers, Fighting Green, Fighting Hawks, Force, Green Hawks, Nodaks, North Stars, Pride, Roughriders, Spirit, Sundogs and Thunderhawks. WDAZ-TV reported. One possibility that was dumped Tuesday night was Flickertails, which the school used before adopting the Fighting Sioux nickname.

The 11-member committee, which is being advised by branding consultant Padilla CRT, has not set a date for its next meeting.

"Now it's really time for conversation — for people to make their case for particular options — and that by definition usually takes more time," UND spokesman Peter Johnson said.

ance in 2014. Goihl batted .401 with a .672 slugging percentage to go along with 17 doubles, 11 home runs and 55 RBI. Goihl has helped Augustana baseball to its most successful four-year stretch in program history, as the Vikings have compiled a record of 148-72 since 2012. He finished his career ranking in the top 10 at Augustana in batting average (.368), slugging percentage (.616), games played (190), runs scored (147), hits (226), doubles (46), home runs (34), RBI (163), total bases (378) and stolen bases (42).

Goihl is the third Viking to be drafted in the MLB First-Year Player Draft in the last four years, and the seventh player from Augustana to be selected in the MLB Draft.

SDSU's Adam Bray, a right-handed pitcher from Eden Prairie, Minnesota,

was selected by Los Angeles Dodgers in the 33rd round (1,002nd overall). A three-time all-Summit League honoree, Bray finished his collegiate career last month as the Jackrabbits' career leader in strikeouts (264), innings pitched (326 2/3) and games started (51), while ranking second in wins with a 23-16 career record. He posted an 8-4 record during the 2015 season with a 2.96 earned run average in 14 starts, striking out 80 and walking only 25 in 91 1/3 innings.

Coppola and Bray are the 12th and 13th Jackrabbit players to be selected in the Major League Baseball draft since its inception in 1965. They are the sixth and seventh different SDSU baseball players to be selected since 2007, and the first since pitcher Layne Somsen was picked in the 22nd round of the 2013 draft by Cincinnati. Somsen has since been promoted to the Reds Triple-A affiliate in Louisville, Kentucky

Ties Taken In Draft

OMAHA, Neb. (AP) — Eight players with ties to Nebraska have been selected in the Major League Baseball draft.

Tyler Peitzmeier of Yutan, who pitches for Cal State Fullerton, and Nebraska catcher Tanner Lubach out of Lincoln Southwest High both were taken in the ninth round. Peitzmeier went to the Chicago Cubs and Lubach to the Los Angeles Angels.
