as HSC administrator for approximately 10 years. He resigned in 2011 to become the chief executive officer of the Arizona State Hospital in Phoenix. The Arizona hospital system includes a psychiatric in-patient facility and a sexual offender facility, with a combined budget of \$60 million.

At the time of his move to Arizona, Nelson served as president of the Western Psychiatric State Hospital Association (WPSHA).

Nelson was appointed as interim director of the HSC in November 2001. He was the former supervisor of the State Training School in Plankinton and had spent nine years in the South Dakota corrections system.

He left his HSC position July 15, 2011, and began his Arizona position Aug. 1, 2011.

At the time he announced his HSC resignation, Nelson said the Arizona position represented a good career and family move.

"An opportunity came up, and they asked if I was interested in a position out there," Nelson said. "We took a hard look at it as a family and decided it was the right thing for us."

"Our family has taken a look at a number of locations over the years where we might want to end up," he continued. "Phoenix was one of them. It just happened to work out."

Pam Van Meeteren, HSC's clinical coordinator, served as the interim administrator following Nelson's departure. Ric Compton became the new HSC administrator in June 2012.

First SD Artist Laureate Since 1983 Being Honored

STURGIS, S.D. (AP) — South Dakota hasn't named an artist laureate in decades, so Dale Lamphere was understandably in disbelief when he got a call congratulating him on April Fools' Day.

"It was the introduction of other parties — the executive director of the South Dakota Arts Council, for example — that convinced me it wasn't a gag," Lamphere told the *Rapid City Journal*. The Sturgis Area Arts Council will host a reception to honor Lamphere at his studio on Sunday. Lamphere will serve a four-year term as the Artist Laureate of South Dakota, standing as an advocate and leader for the state's arts community.

It's a role that fits Lamphere comfortably. A sculptor for more than 45 years, Lamphere served as a member of the South Dakota Arts Council and the president of the South Dakota Board for the Arts, and contributed pieces to several South Dakota organizations.

Sturgis Public Library Director Julie Moore praised Lamphere's generosity as an artist. Lamphere donated his "Tall Grass II" sculpture to the Sturgis Public Library/City Hall complex in 2007 and sculpted the "Ribbon" donor recognition plaque at the Sturgis Community Theatre for its

have in our competitions," Ronnlund said. "We've had similar conditions, but not in Sweden. When we competed in Greece, we had a lot of rain, but not the wind."

Domagoj Buden, Vavro's Croatian teammate, explained how he adjusts to the wind and the difficulty it creates for him.

"In the wind, you need to shoot stronger," he said. "You can't move your sight in wind, it just doesn't work."

Windy conditions not only create physical complications, but also cause a mental game, according to Ronnlund.

"If (archers) are not capable of working with the wind and do not have fun playing with it, they basically give up," he said. "The wind takes (them) - so to speak - and they lose interest and shoot lower scores."

The two Croatian archers explained the physical and mental implications that the windy conditions caused in the conclusion of Thursday's individual elim-

graduate has an average debt of \$30,000. Currently, 53 percent of college graduates in the country are either jobless or underemployed.

It is for these reasons why Adderley, along with his wife, Adrienne, also a former college professor, created the program.

"Via Nova's motto is 'Start life debt-free, joyful and confident,'" Adrienne explained. "We want to help (the participants) get everything they need so they can go forward without floundering."

The program focuses on teaching the participants (or fellows, as they will be called) entrepreneurship skills and literature in a liberal arts Catholic-faith environment. Fellows from outside the area have the option of living with the Adderleys in their home, which is also where much of the work will take place.

"We're much more interested in enabling the students to learn themselves than forcing them to learn what we think is important," Adderley said.

Antalya, Turkey. Athletes and coaches from Malawi, Africa, had trouble with their travel documentation being accepted by the airline while traveling to the competition.

Eventually, thanks to cooperation between the Turkish authorities, the local airline, World Archery, the organizers and the coach of the Malawian team, the situation was resolved and the athletes arrived just in time for competition.

Malawi subsequently made its international archery debut in Antalya.

"Unfortunately, due to the requirements for entering the USA and the time constraints, we were not able to come to the same conclusion in this situation," Marsh said.

Because of the various locations for these events, World Archery event organizers provide invitation letters to athletes once they are confirmed in the online entry system. With this process, visas are usually issued by a host country's embassy much more quickly and easily.

According to the U.S. Department of State, under INA section 214(b), the process of obtaining a visa to enter the U.S. requires presumption of immigrant intent. That means a person attempting to obtain a visa is required by law to sufficiently demonstrate that they have strong ties to their own home country that will com-

pel them to leave the United States at the end of their temporary stay which would include, strong ties being a job, a home or relationship with family and friends.

An interview will take place in which each application will be looked at individually, and the applicant's circumstances, travel plans, financial resources and ties outside of the United States will be considered to ensure the applicant's departure after a temporary visit.

If standards are not met, the visa will be denied.

As far as this year's WAYC, the Indian delegation was the only one that had visas rejected. World Archery also had a judge that could not attend, since her visa was issued too late.

"World Archery will undergo a full investigation into the incident and agree the best steps to take only after this comprehensive assessment has been completed," Marsh said.

Despite the unfortunate circumstances, India's flag still hangs in the archery field, along with the rest of the other 50 countries taking part in the tournament.

"Together, we will work to ensure it doesn't happen again," Marsh said. "We fully expect to see the Indian team back on the competition field soon."

"Everybody likes Dale," Peterson said. "He's always evolving as an artist, he's been a great member of the arts community. I think he's a very worthy successor to that title."

Peterson is also a member of the Sturgis Arts Council, and her colleague, Secretary Dorothy Pulscher, would fully support her characterization of Lamphere.

"He's warm, welcoming and very generous, and his work is extraordinary," Pulscher said. "He'd always give us wonderful sculptures for whatever we organized, and he never charged as much as he could have or frankly should have."

Lamphere has also long been an advocate for arts education programs in schools.

"It's not that we want more artists, though that's always a good thing," Lamphere said. "But we need to teach creative, outside-the-box thinking so we can have innovative businesspersons, scientists and educators."

Lamphere is the first South Dakota artist laureate since the 1983 death of Oscar Howe, who was given the honor in 1954. He described the title as a "great honor" following Howe's term.

"Oscar Howe had such a huge national impact on Native Art, changing it for all time," Lamphere said. "He didn't directly affect me as a sculptor, but I've always

admired how he establishes images in terms of planes, how they're articulated when they change shape."

Lamphere's own artwork tends to feature spiritual or humanistic themes, something he always felt was important.

"I've always appreciated the inherent dignity of my fellow man, and I try to reach that whether I'm working in classic or realistic or abstract work," Lamphere said.

Humbled as he was by the honor, Lamphere said he would "try to rise to the occasion, as always."

"It didn't come with a job description," Lamphere said. "But it's up to me to define that for myself."

Lamphere said he's already met with a number of cultural groups to gather ideas for the arts community in the next few years.

"There's such a rich environment and quality of people and artists here," Lamphere said. "I've seen growth in the arts over the decades, and it's wonderful to see scores of first-class artists in the state. That's something to be proud of."

Lamphere will continue to encourage that, and set an example for future South Dakota artist laureates.

"I want future recipients to have to work a bit in support of the arts, so I have to set the bar for that," Lamphere said. "I feel an obligation to."

"People in this generation of college graduates are continually deferring starting their lives," said Adderley. "What we're suggesting is that the better way of approaching life after our program would be not to become employed by somebody else but to be the owner of a business and employ other people. That's why we want to emphasize small business entrepreneurship in our program."

Last fall, Via Nova ran a pilot program with five fellows who were interested in learning about playwrighting. At the semester's end, the five left with a clearer sense of what they wanted to do next, which is Adderley's goal.

"Ultimately, we want them to leave us with a plan for their lives," he said. "Most of their work here is going to be them forming those plans."
