## USDA Accepting Loan And Grant Apps

LINCOLN, Neb. — USDA Rural Development announces the timeframe to submit pre-applications for Section 514 Farm Labor Housing (FLH) loans and Section 516 Farm Labor Housing grants for the construction of new off-farm FLH units and related facilities for domestic farm laborers and for the purchase and substantial rehabilitation of an existing non-FLH property. The intended purpose of these loans and grants is to increase the number of available housing units for domestic farm laborers.

To be eligible to apply for a Section 516 grant or Section 514 loan for off-farm FLH, the applicant must be a broad-based non-profit organization, including community and faith-based organizations, a non-profit organization of farm workers, a federally recognized Indian tribe, an agency or political subdivision of a state or local government, or a public agency. In addition to these entities, limited partnerships which have a non-profit entity as its general partner may apply for 514 loans

There are no community population restrictions. All Nebraska communities are eligible for off-farm FLH loans and grants.

Eligible occupants of FLH projects may include very low, low, and moderate income tenants with occupations associ-ated with cultivating the soil or raising or harvesting any agriculture or aquaculture commodity; or in catching, netting, handling, planting, drying, packing, grading, storing or preserving in the unprocessed stage any agriculture or aquaculture commodity; or delivering to storage, market or a carrier for transportation to market or to processing any agricultural or aquacultural commodity in its unprocessed stage.


