# A Trade Deal **Everyone Hates?**

arely have many of us seen so much hatred across such a broad pectrum of political thought as the amount of animus currently directed toward the proposed Trans-Pacific Partnership, a 12-nation pact that could either open up new markets to America's goods (especially for agricultural products) or gut the economic foundation from millions of working Americans. It all depends on who you listen to or read.

Many Democrats hate it and many Republicans hate it. Many liberals hate it and many conservatives hate it. Many Barack Obama supporters hate it and many Obama haters REALLY hate it. Unions hate it. Environmentalists hate it. On this opinion page, columnists as diverse as the liberal Robert Reich and the conservative Michelle Malkin hate it.

As such, the deal is hung up in limbo. A displaced workers' aid portion of TPP was rejected resoundingly by the U.S. House last Friday by a vote of 302-126. At least 140 Democrats — including, ultimately, former speaker Nancy Pelosi — bucked the president in opposing the bill. The House then approved a fast-track measure for the pact, but without the aid deal, the bill will not proceed to the White House. (Obama is seeking fast-track authority to negotiate such deals, which means he would be able to hammer out trade deals and present them to Congress for an up-or-down vote.)

Getting a grasp on this has been difficult for casual observers. We see Democrats and Republicans aligning with unusual bedfellows on the matter. Obama has been working with Speaker of the House John Boehner (R), Rep. Paul Ryan (R) and the U.S. Chamber of Commerce to push the measure, while opponents from all over the ideological spectrum have been finding their own reasons to coexist on a common

Very few people know the full scope of TPP, the details of which were negotiated in secret. The deal would encompass 40 percent of global economic activity, and according to The New Yorker, it is "less a traditional trade deal than a comprehensive economic treaty and, at least for the United States, a strategic hedge against the vast and growing weight of Chinese regional influence.

But enough details of the secretive pact have been leaked to mobi-

One of the culprits in this current showdown is the ghosts of the North American Free Trade Agreement (NAFTA), originally proposed by Republican Ronald Reagan but ultimately passed by Democrat Bill Clinton 20 years ago. This bill opened up trade markets in Canada and Mexico, but is widely seen to have led to hundreds of thousands of jobs leaving this country and hurting wages in the process. (It could theoretically be argued that this impacted Yankton when it lost its Aalf's plant in the late 1990s.) While TPP isn't really the same thing as NAFTA, it is close enough to draw the ire of unions and lawmakers from several industrial states

Despite Friday's stunning rejection, there is still some belief that TPP will ultimately be passed in some form, but more input is sought. For the White House and TPP's allies, there appears to be no choice in the matter. It's time to put the cards on the table or risk losing the whole game.

# IN HISTORY

Today's Highlight in History: On June 16, 1955, members of Argentina's military bombarded the Plaza de Mayo in Aires in a failed attempt to assassinate President Juan Domingo Peron and his Cabinet, causing hundreds of civilian deaths, the same day Peron was excommunicated by Pope Pius XII for expelling two bishops from his country (however, the ban was effectively lifted in 1963).

On this date: In 1567, Mary, Queen of Scots, was imprisoned in Lochleven Castle in Scotland. (She escaped almost a year later but ended up imprisoned again.)

In 1858, accepting the Illinois Republican Party's nomination for the U.S. Senate, Abraham Lincoln said the slavery issue

had to be resolved, declaring, "A house di-vided against itself cannot stand." In 1903, Ford Motor Co. was incorpo-

In 1911, IBM had its beginnings as the Computing-Tabulating-Recording Co. was incorporated in New York State. In 1933, the National Industrial Recovery Act became law with President Franklin D. Roosevelt's signature. (The Act was later struck down by the U.S. Supreme Court.) The Federal Deposit Insurance Corp. was founded as President Roosevelt signed the Banking Act of 1933.

In 1943, comedian Charles Chaplin, 54, married his fourth wife, 18-year-old Oona O'Neill, daughter of playwright Eugene O'Neill, in Carpinteria, California. In 1944, George Stinney, a 14-year-old

black youth, became the youngest person to die in the electric chair as the state of South Carolina executed him for the murders of two white girls, Betty June Binnicker, 11, and Mary Emma Thames, 7.

In 1955, the Disney animated feature "Lady and the Tramp" had its world premiere in Chicago.
In 1963, the world's first female space

traveler. Valentina Tereshkova. 26. was aunched into orbit by the Soviet Union aboard Vostok 6; she spent 71 hours in flight, circling the Earth 48 times before returning safely.

In 1978, President Jimmy Carter and Panamanian leader Omar Torrijos exchanged the instruments of ratification for

the Panama Canal treaties.

In 1987, a jury in New York acquitted
Bernhard Goetz of attempted murder in
the subway shooting of four youths he said were going to rob him: however. Goetz was convicted of illegal weapons possession. (In 1996, a civil jury ordered Goetz to pay \$43 million to one of the persons he'd shot.) In 1999, Vice President Al Gore formal-

ly opened his candidacy for the Democratic presidential nomination. Kathleen Ann Soiah, a fugitive member of the Symbionese Liberation Army, was captured in St. Paul Minnesota, where she had made a new life under the name Sara Jane Olson. Thabo

Mbeki took the oath as president of South Africa, succeeding Nelson Mandela. Ten years ago: On the eve of Iran's presidential election, President George W. Bush said the voting was designed to keep power in the hands of a few rulers "through an electoral process that ignores the basic requirements of democracy." European Union leaders put on hold plans to unite their 25 nations under a single constitution. Masked gunmen took dozens of toddlers hostage at an international school in Siem Reap, Cambodia, killing a 3-year-old Canadian boy before they were overpowered by

Five years ago: After meeting with President Barack Obama at the White House, BP Chairman Carl-Henric Svanberg announced the oil giant was establish ing a \$20 billion claim fund and suspending dividends as he insisted, "We care about the small people." Movie director Ronald Neame ("The Poseidon Adventure") died in Los Angeles at age 99.



# **Fooling The Rubes**

The Delphi Technique is a deceptive, manipulative and unethical group dynamics method which exploits human social instincts in order to coerce people into a pre-ordained group "consensus."
