That begs the question,

Cull said only Monday that his team will "have to take it one step at a time.'

Cull did, however, show a number of archery dignitaries around the complex over the weekend, from the indoor facilities on out to the field ranges. Among those dignitaries were Greg Easton (president of Easton Foundations), Ugur Erdener (World Archery president) and Dragomir Cioroslan (with the United States Olympic

Committee). If that's any indication, perhaps Yankton could be in line for some kind of Olympic Training Center designation, or some kind of other World Archery event – there would be plenty of other options.

'Hopefully we're in line for some other possible tournaments, in some different disciplines," Cull said. "We'll just have to see what the future holds.'

There also remains plenty of space for potential growth around the Yankton archery complex.

The Archery Business Park, located on 20 acres east of the NFAA headquarters, is still trying to attract potential businesses for that space, which would only boost Yankton's bids for potential tournaments – having restaurants in that area, for example, would really help.

Until that happens, Cull and his team will use what they learned from the past year (preparing for and then hosting the WAYC) to improve on an already firstclass archery complex that has our town on the interna-

tional map. "We're just going to keep doing what we do. Keep doing a really good job of it," Cull said.
