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### **Rail Board Delays Bid Decision For Line Rehab**

PIERRE — The South Dakota Railroad Board decided Wednesday to hold off final action on the latest bids for rehabilitating the stateowned line from Chamberlain to Presho.

The board instead plans a special meeting June 25 when the members will discuss how to proceed.

The board decided on two previous occasions to rebid the project. That doesn't seem to be in the works this time, however, because three firms submitted bids

Bids from two of the companies — London, Englandbased Balfour and Beatty, and Kansas City-based Musselman and Hall Contractors – are disqualified because they didn't fulfill federal and state bid requirements.

The company left standing is New York City-based RailWorks Tracks Systems, which was the only bidder last time. RailWorks' bid was much higher than the engineer's estimate for the project.

This time the difference is about \$1.5 million more than the lowest possible combination of the three sets of bids submitted.

Bids for all other pieces of what now appears to be a \$36.5 million project have been accepted.

If the latest RailWorks bid is accepted, the project's total cost will be about \$6.5 million more than the engineer's total estimate.

Gov. Dennis Daugaard is willing to put \$4 million of Future Fund grant program revenue toward covering the shortfall if the Railroad Board will provide the other \$2.5 million, according to state Department of Transportation officials.

Board chairman Todd Yeaton of Kimball suggested the \$2.5 million be a no-interest loan that would

The project would refurbish the bridge over the Missouri River west of Chamberlain and upgrade the track west through Kennebec to Presho.

Yeaton said it was "a head shaker" that so much money could ride on whether bid documents were properly signed and filed.

The surcharge also will be discussed at the June 25 meeting that will be held in the DOT commission room starting at 1 p.m. CT in Pierre.

The Wheat Growers organization already has a major fertilizer and grain complex under construction along the line at Kennebec in anticipation of the rehab project proceeding. Bruce Lindholm, who

oversees rail programs for DOT, said the fee hasn't been discussed with Wheat Grovers or the regional railroad authority for what's known as the Mitchell Rapid City line, or with Dakota Southern, the operator that leases the line.

A \$50 surcharge is in place already for rail cars that come onto the line between Mitchell and Chamberlain.

That \$50 is to repay a \$3.5 million no-interest state loan made for that previous segment of the work east of the Missouri River.

Lindholm said the Railroad Board's loan and grant fund will have \$4.7 million at the end of 2017 and would have a balance of more than \$20 million in 2020 without the suggested \$2.5 million loan.

"It doesn't go negative. It doesn't even go to zero," Lindholm said.

Board member Gary Doering of Cavour said he doesn't want the fee to scare business away.

American Colloid Company would keep rail cars there until they are needed at the company's operation at Colony, Wyoming.
American Colloid intends

to repair the track at a cost estimated at \$25,000 to \$30,000 in turn for a free lease for four years. The lease value is currently \$5,425 annually. The company would start paying in year five.

The board gave its approval to that deal Wednesday.

The board also agreed Wednesday to consider sale of state-owned land along the line at Presho to Dakota Mill and Grain, based in Rapid City.

The Warren Karlen Ranch meanwhile seeks to build a pea-loading facility at Reliance along the rehab project's route but that discussion was put aside Wednesday.

The switches on the main line at Reliance need to be replaced as part of the work.

#### **Prison Riot Investigation Nearly Finished**

LINCOLN, Neb. (AP) — Nebraska's corrections director says a formal investigation into a prison riot last month is nearly complete.

Director Scott Frakes said Wednesday that he hopes to have the final report by the end of this week.

The review was launched after a May 10 prisoner uprising at the Tecumseh State Correctional Institution that left two inmates dead. Death certificates from the state say Donald Peacock and Shon Collins died of blunt force trauma to the head.

Frakes says the prison remains on lockdown, although inmates have been allowed to have visitors and some access to outdoor recreation yards. He says he hopes to have final damage from the disturbance cleaned up in the next three weeks.

#### Man Died As A Result Of Accidental Fall

WATERTOWN (AP) - Police in Watertown have concluded that the death of a 22-year-old man whose body was found this morning was the result of an accidental fall while climbing on the exterior of a building.

Police officers responded to a report of an unresponsive man behind the Hubbard Feeds building in Watertown Wednesday morning. When they arrived to the scene, they found the body of Angel Montes DeOca with signs of

Police Chief Lee McPeek says DeOca was from Watertown.

The state Division of Criminal Investigation is helping with the probe.

#### **Worker Hurt At Neb. Construction Site**

PAPILLION, Neb. (AP) — Authorities say worker at a construction site in eastern Nebraska is in critical condition after being shocked.

Sarpy County Sheriff Capt. Rolly Yost says the person was working Wednesday afternoon at the site of the new Papillion Public Works Department when a service line was touched. The worker was shocked and taken to a hospital.

The Lincoln Star Journal reports a backhoe had affected electrical service to the building prior to the worker's injury. Additional information is not available.

#### **School Gets \$218K To Address Suicide**

PINE RIDGE (AP) — Federal education officials have given Pine Ridge School in western South Dakota \$218,000 to help students and teachers in their recovery from a string of student suicides and attempts. The school serves the Oglala Sioux Tribe on the Pine Ridge

Indian Reservation. It requested the money after seeing a significant increase in counseling referrals, people saying they were thinking of suicide, and suicide attempts.

The reservation had at least nine suicides between December and April. Four of the people were Pine Ridge School students; two were in high school and the other two were middle-schoolers.

William Mendoza, director of the White House Initiative on American Indian and Alaska Native Education, says the Obama administration is "committed to working with the Pine Ridge community as it heals.'

#### Man Dies Following Motorcycle Crash

FUNK, Nebraska (AP) — Authorities say a 26-year-old man has died after the motorcycle he was riding crashed into a utility vehicle in southern Nebraska.

The Phelps County Sheriff's Office said Wednesday that Douglas Davison was traveling on a dirt bike Sunday morning when it struck a utility vehicle on a roadway northwest of Funk. Davison, also of Funk, was thrown from the bike. Authorities say Davison was pronounced dead at the

scene. An autopsy has been ordered. The case is under investigation.


