"I believe that a graduated license is the way to go," he said. "It allows the juvenile more rights to driving. When I was first receiving my license, I would have been appalled to have a GDL provision, but as a parent and police officer, I see the benefits, as it keeps kids

He made special mention of one of the GDL provisions: passenger restrictions.

"Anytime you have another opportunity for a distraction, another influence that has an adolescent mindset, it creates a problem for the driver," he

Because of South Dakota's general rural communities, he does not agree that a minimum age of 16 before receiving a learner's permit is optimal for all locations across the nation.

'Rurally, some of these kids are driving or moving equipment on private property, farm, or ranches at 8 – 10 years old," he said. "The more rural you are, obviously the farther away from school, so it really becomes helpful when a juvenile can drive to themselves school. It also allows them to move equipment during harvest or planting.

For Paulsen and his force, educating juveniles is more important than strictly enforcing the law, in most scenarios. He explained that while the YPD does occasionally write tickets, it's in an effort to make teens

The educational movement of teen driver safety is not only a concern of city officers and departments.

"From my perspective of a highway safety director, I'm more concerned with the question: Are we heading in the right direction?" Axdahl said. "The stats on our direction are showing that we are."

The improved statistics could be in relation to the millions of dollars utilized statewide in the educational efforts to promote safer driving, according to Axdahl.

Lawmakers Shrug Off Pope

In the encyclical, a landmark foray by the Vatican into the area of environmental policy, Francis called for a bold cultural revolution, framing climate change as an urgent moral issue and blaming global warming on an unfair, fossil fuel-based industrial model that harms the poor most. He urged people of every faith to save God's creation for future generations.

Francis is to address lawmakers in September in the first speech by a pope

Despite his status as an exalted spiritual figure and leader of the world's 1.2 billion Catholics, his pronouncements on climate were received much as a presidential address might be: with enthusiastic embraces from those who already agreed with him, and disavowals or silence from most everyone else.

President Barack Obama fell into the former category. "I welcome His Holiness Pope Francis's encyclical, and deeply admire the pope's decision to make the case — clearly, powerfully, and with the full moral authority of his position — for action on global climate change," the president said in a statement.

The Republicans vying to replace Obama were not so full-throated. A number of them, including Sens. Ted Cruz of Texas and Rand Paul of Kentucky, did not respond to requests for comment or avoided answering when questioned by reporters on the topic.

Former Florida Gov. Jeb Bush questioned the pope's foray into climate science when discussing the issue Wednesday ahead of the encyclical's release.

"I don't think we should politicize our faith," he said.

A statement from a spokesman for former Texas Gov. Rick Perry did not directly mention Francis but said, "Gov.

Perry believes the climate is always changing, but it's not clear what role humans have in it." It's not the first time the Catholic

Church's teachings on political or social issues have created complications for Catholic lawmakers who take a different view. House Democratic leader Nancy Pelosi of California, who is Catholic, faced questions in the run-up to passage of Obama's health care bill over her support for abortion rights in light of the church's opposition.

But with his entry into the contentious politics of climate, and his attempt to reframe the issue in moral terms, Francis opened a new chapter in the long-running debate over the intersection of politics and religion.

And it was one that most Republicans did not particularly welcome.

"I think the pope needs to continue to study this," said Sen. Jeff Sessions, R-Ala. "I think it will be given respectful treatment, but I don't think it's going to change a lot of votes."

Guinan said this additional moisture has led to some adverse effects for crops in parts of the Midwest.

Some very wet conditions exist across the north-central region, and we are starting to see some impacts in regards to the crops that are feeling a lot of wetness," he said. "Saturated soybeans and some nutrient issues with nitrogen issues have created some yellow corn. There are two states still running well behind on their soybean planting because of the wetness."

Missouri has only planted 42 percent of its soybean crop while Kansas has only managed to plant 57 percent. Both states are reporting the majority of their current soybean crop in the fair to very poor range.

Closer to home, South Dakota State Climatologist Dennis Todey said impacts from wet weather in the upper Midwest aren't able to be measured

'We're still early enough in the season that we can't give any assessments," Todey said. "There's a couple of tradeoffs — the cool and wet conditions help to offset some of the potential stresses you get during the middle of summer. That's a good thing, but if it slows down development too much and we get too late into the season with delayed development, then we lose some of that.'

Todey said he's not as worried for crops north of Missouri and Kansas, but more will be known in the coming

"I'm not terribly concerned overall," he said. "I think this is going to be largely beneficial, but we'll know more in three to four weeks after we get through July to see if we have corn that's accumulating well enough.

Guinan said the additional rainfall

has been beneficial in that it's nearly wiped out the large swaths of drought that dominated the upper and lower plains throughout the winter.

"It looks like someone took an eraser out and took away quite a bit of those dry conditions," he said.

Currently, a thin sliver of abnormally dry conditions stretches through northeast Nebraska and southeast South Dakota, including the Yankton area, with expectations that this will improve throughout the summer. Current forecast models say there's

a 90 percent chance El Nino will persist through the end of the year and an 85 percent chance it will stick around through the first part of 2016.

Forecasts also call for above-average precipitation and below average temperatures in northeast Nebraska and southeast South Dakota throughout the rest of the summer.

implements a six-month holding period (or three month with driver's education course) and restricts nighttime driving without a parent passenger from 10 p.m. to

South Dakota allows teens to obtain their learner's permit at three months past the age of 14 if they completed driver's education or six months past 14 without formal training. There are no required supervised driving hours, passenger or cell phone restrictions. Teens can receive their operator's license restriction

free at age 16. The final category studied by WalletHub had all state officials in agreement: Impaired driving in the state is an issue.

South Dakota has the highest number of teen DUI's per teen population, according to the WalletHub study.

State law enforcement officials and safety department responded to the drinking and driving issue by implementing additional impaired driving enforcement to promote safer

"We've substantially increased our sobriety check points," Axdahl said. "We've also increased our saturation patrols with all highway patrols that work with the highway safety state wide. Both of those concerted law enforcement partnerships are partially to credit for (a reduction) of alcohol related fatalities.

Axdahl would like to see studies compliment South Dakota on its 24/7 Sobriety Program, an example of an additional effort made by South Dakota law enforcement in response to impaired driving issues launched in 2005. The program is issued to chronic offenders of DWI's, making them submit to a breathalyzer test twice a day.
