# Couples, Officials, Foes Ready For Gay Marriage Ruling

CINCINNATI — With a U.S. Supreme Court ruling on same-sex marriage expected any day now, gay couples in states with bans are making wedding plans, courthouse officials are getting ready for different scenarios and steadfast foes are working on their strategies to keep up the opposition.

Marriage license bureaus are bracing for a rush of applicants if the court overrules bans. Meanwhile, there's been a series of planning sessions by groups that intend to explore religious objection responses to protect "traditional marriage" limited to heterosexuals.

Gay couples, such as Ethan Fletcher and Andrew Hickam of Cincinnati, are gearing up for a quick run to the courthouse in Ohio, Michigan, Kentucky and Tennessee — the states involved in the cases that were argued in April before the justices. They're among 14 states that ban same-sex marriage, and if the high court rules in favor of gay marriage, it would apply nationally.

Fletcher, 31, a University of Cincinnati senior academic adviser, and Hickam, 30, a GE Aviation engineer, have arranged to take off work to get their license if the decision allows immediate same-sex marriages and will then plan a formal wedding. They became engaged nearly two years ago but decided against getting married in another state as long as there was the possibility they could do it at home.

"Well, we live here and we pay taxes here and our families live here," said Fletcher, adding that they want his grandmother and Hickam's mother to be able to attend. "We didn't feel that it was reasonable for us to have to travel out of state for the

freedom to marry."

In Hamilton County, where Cincinnati is located, the marriage license bureau said other courthouse staffers have been cross-trained and forms are available online to help speed the process. Court officials in Cuyahoga County, where Cleveland is located, say they're prepared to process triple the usual number of applications.

Probate Court Judge Jan Michael Long, of Pickaway County, near Columbus, said he and other probate judges met to discuss potential rulings and their impacts. There are a lot of procedural issues involving the need for gender-neutral wording and who gets legal notifications, he said, and it could be complicated depending on when the court ruling becomes effective and how it's worded.

In Ingham County, Michigan, Clerk Barb Byrum said she might not wait for a new marriage license form from the state, and could simply white-out "bride" and "groom" on the application when she gets the legal green light.

# Faith Groups And Law Enforcement Join Death Penalty Debate

LINCOLN, Neb. — Nebraska voters can expect to hear a lot about the death penalty this summer from influential people in their communities, from their local church pastor to the county sheriff.

Faith groups and law enforcement are jumping into the debate as petition circulators try to gather enough signatures to place the issue on the 2016 general election ballot.

Law enforcement groups have generally supported the punishment each year when Nebraska lawmakers considered repealing it, while religious groups spoke against the death penalty.

Both sides are now turning their attention to the public after the Legislature voted last month to abolish capital punishment, overruling Gov. Pete Ricketts' veto. Nebraska became the first typically conservative state to end the death penalty since North Dakota in 1973.

Some lawmakers said they opposed the punishment for moral or religious reasons, while others argued it was too expensive and will never likely be carried out because of legal appeals. Shortly after the vote, death penalty supporters launched a petition drive to keep the death penalty.

On Friday, the ACLU of Nebraska said it had received a \$400,000 donation from Proteus Action League, a group based in Amherst, Mass., that has spent millions on campaigns to abolish the death penalty. The money will go to Nebraskans for Public Safety, a coalition that is urging voters not to sign the petitions.

Nebraskans for the Death Penalty, a group with ties to Ricketts, has to gather roughly 57,000 signatures of registered voters by Aug. 27 to place the law on the ballot. The signatures must come from at least 5 percent of the registered voters in 38 of Nebraska's 93 counties.

Faith leaders said they plan to discuss their church's position on capital punishment in sermons, homilies and bulletins. Leaders from Catholic, Methodist, Presbyterian, evangelical and Episcopalian churches in Nebraska have all voiced concerns about the death penalty.

## Train Strikes Empty Car On Tracks

DUNCAN, Neb. (AP) — Officials say no one was injured when a train traveling through Nebraska struck an empty car parked on the tracks.

The Union Pacific train hit an unoccupied car early Sunday near Duncan. The car got stuck to the train and traveled with it for about a half mile. The car then hit a bridge and burst into flames.

The train was traveling from Oakland, California, to Chicago.

Company spokesman Mark Davis tells the *Grand Island Independent* that the fire damaged two rail cars with containers and damaged the bridge. The train crew was not hurt.

Davis says the tracks and line in the area would be closed through early Monday to repair the bridge.

Additional information about the owner of the car is not available.

## UPS Employee Indicted On Theft Of Mail

RAPID CITY (AP) — An employee of the U.S. Postal Service in western South Dakota has been indicted on a theft of mail charge.

Authorities are accusing Daniel Newman, of Rapid City, of embezzling letters, post cards, packages, bags and other mail between November and March. Authorities say Newman stole money, gift cards and other items contained in the mail he embezzled.

Federal court records show a jury trial against Newman has been scheduled for late August. He was arrested Friday and has pleaded not guilty to one count of theft of mail matter by officer or employee.

Newman's attorney could not immediately be reached to comment on the charge.

## Man Stabbed To Death In Des Moines

DES MOINES, Iowa (AP) — Authorities say a 27-year-old man was stabbed to death after a fight broke out at a party in Des Moines.

Police say officers responded to a 911 early Sunday and found the 27-year-old man along with 23-year-old person. Both had stab wounds and were taken to a Des Moines hospital. The 27-year-old man later died from his injuries.

A third person, identified as a man, showed up at a separate hospital with injuries.

Police say the three people were linked to a fight that broke out at a party on the city's east side and spilled into the street.

The case remains under investigation.

## Hot Springs Native Wins Miss SD

HOT SPRINGS, S.D. (AP) — A new Miss South Dakota has been crowned.

Miss Oahe, Autumn Simunek of Hot Springs, was crowned Miss South Dakota 2015 Saturday night in Hot Springs.

Simunek also won the preliminary talent award Thursday night. For her talent, she performed the classic pop vocal "Hallelujah."

Simunek is the second consecutive former Miss South Dakota's Outstanding Teen to go on to win the title of Miss South Dakota.

The 22-year-old is a senior at the University of South Dakota.

Simunek will represent South Dakota in the Miss America pageant in Atlantic City, New Jersey, in September.

## Name Change For Devils Tower Sought

CASPER, Wyo. (AP) — Public comment is being gathered on whether to change the name of the Devils Tower geographic landmark in northeast Wyoming to Bear Lodge.

The request for the name change was made last November by Arvol Looking Horse, who describes himself as an American Indian spiritual leader.

The proposal has drawn opposition. If the name were to change, it would only apply to the geographic rock and the nearby hamlet, both called Devils Tower.

The name of the Devils Tower National Monument could only be changed by Congress or a presidential executive order.

Monument Superintendent Tim Reid tells the *Casper Star-Tribune* that the National Park Service doesn't have a position on the name.

Devils Tower became the country's first national monument when it was created in 1906.
